City's NEW jetty a landmark

he new Coogee Beach Jetty is now complete and was officially opened by Commissioner Julian Donaldson on Saturday May 29th 1999.

About 200 people turned out for the opening which was very much a local affair, and included a special touch of 80 year old Coogee local Wilfred Poole talking about the significance of the Coogee Jetty to the local community.

To celebrate the completion of the new Coogee Beach Jetty, the City of Cockburn will be hosting a "Coogee Beach Party" in December this year when the weather warms up. The day will be jam-packed with action, including sand-castle building competitions, sausage sizzles, swimming races, and all sorts of beach games. Everyone is invited and we'll keep you posted with all the details in the November-December edition of the Soundings.

"The original Coogee Beach Jetty was designed by the Fremantle Harbour Trust, now the Fremantle Port Authority, in

1959. It was built in the early 1960's by the Harbour Trust at a cost of 2,400 Pounds." Commissioner Donaldson said, in his opening speech.

"The original Coogee Beach Jetty, as with this new jetty, was always intended to be and used as a recreational jetty."

This new jetty is a lot higher than the old jetty so that damage caused by the wind and waves will be significantly minimised.

It extends 98m out to sea, and has lighting along the length of the jetty for safety and enjoyment. There is a high viewing platform at the end of the jetty for people to enjoy fishing and Western Australia's beautiful sunsets over the ocean.

This new jetty features a Karri timber deck supported by 50 steel piles and also has handrails for safety. The lower level is a swimming deck with stainless steel ladders to climb out of the water. With the feasibility study, design and architectural plans, materials, labour and construction, the City of Cockburn has spent approximately \$800,000 on this new Coogee Beach Jetty.

The new design will ensure that the jetty will be a major landmark in Cockburn for many years to come


What do these two birds have in common?



The City of Cockburn recently engaged environmental scientists Alan Tingay and Associates to develop a Greening Plan for the City.

And an upcoming community consultation being held over the next few months will be your opportunity to give the City your ideas and input about the greening and beautification of the Cockburn.

The key objective of the Greening Plan is to provide a detailed plan for the maintenance and enhancement of:

- remanent vegetation within the City and the revegetation of previously cleared areas.
- road reserves and
- public land in order to enhance ecological values, landscape, streetscape and community amenity.

The Plan will serve as a guide for on ground works, including street scaping and to a lesser extent vegetation in parks, and future policy and planning applications.

In developing the Greening Plan, the consultants need your help, as community consultation will form an important component of the plan, and the City believes that the document should be a community-based initiative.

As a part of the Community Consultation process the following events will occur:

- Shopping centre displays. It is hoped the displays will raise awareness of the Greening Plan, advertise the Community Consultation Workshop and provide an avenue for early input. These displays should be seen in mid-July.
- Student Workshops and Community Consultation Workshops which will provide an avenue for comments, ideas and discussion by the general public and school children. These workshops will take pace during August.
- As a result of the Workshops, a Steering Committee will be formed, which will be made up of community representatives, members of the City's Arbour Committee and the consultants. The Steering Committee will meet monthly, and will discuss, analyse and comment on the production of the Greening Plan.

The Steering Committee members will therefore be the drivers for the production of the Greening Plan, with the consultants providing technical advice and adjusting the Plan to Suit.

"The City of Cockburn is very excited about the Greening Plan, and is looking forward to on-going community interest and consultation in developing the plan," the City's Environmental Services Manager Darren Walsh said.

The result should be a Greening Plan which represents the community's interest and concerns, combined with the City's commitments and requirements

Footpaths

The City of Cockburn has placed \$200,000 on its 1999/2000 budget to replace slab footpaths in Hamilton Hill, Spearwood and Coolbellup.

"City of Cockburn's Community Needs Survey conducted last year showed that residents wanted improvements in the quality of footpaths and street verges," the City's Director of Engineering and Works, Bevis Greay said.

Within Cockburn, there is approximately 100 kilometres of slab footpath and a program is being implemented to replace these over the next 10 years

Streetscapes

The new residential estates of Atwell, Beeliar, Success, Glen Iris and others have excellent landscaping in the road verge and medians (traffic islands) and there is the expectation that this standard will be maintained.

The established remaining parts of these suburbs can also expect improvements to their areas.

The City of Cockburn has appointed Allan Conroy as its new Parks Manager. Part of his portfolio is to prepare plans and standards to maintain the high standards of landscaping in these areas.

Consultants Alan Tingay & Associates, have also been appointed to prepare a greening plan for the City. This report will lay the foundation for ongoing landscaping and improvements in residential and commercial areas. We will keep customers informed of the progress of the greening plan through the Soundings

Bus Shelters

throughout the City over the next five years. For the past 20 years, older style concrete bus shelters have been installed as there was no other choices available in those times.

There are about 161 bus shelters out of a total of 521 bus stop locations.

"In recent times a greater variety of bus shelters has become available. Many of these styles are dependent on advertising being included," the City's Director of Engineering and Works, Bevis Greav said.

Cockburn has 521 Bus Stops. Of these 161 are bus shelters, 253 are an orange post in the ground, and 107 are bus seats

Out of all those, 271 that do not have a concrete pad, commonly known as a hardstand.

"These shelters are large and residents often do not want them in front of their houses," City of Cockburn's Senior Technical Officer Ian Street said.

Ian recently arranged to have a smaller style bus shelter installed in North Lake Road near the Lakes Shopping Centre. Another type is outside the Phoenix Shopping Centre in Rockingham Road

Your views wanted for Councillor numbers and City Wards

In November 1998, Council considered the matter of its Ward Boundaries and how the distribution of Councillors throughout the City should be reflected within each Ward.

At that time, Council decided no change was necessary and that the matter should be reviewed again during 1999. Therefore, the status quo remained and the number of Councillors representing each Ward was retained, as follows: –

West Ward


4 Councillors representing 11103 electors
North Ward

3 Councillors representing 8916 electors Coastal Ward

3 Councillors representing 8282 electors
East Ward

2 Councillors representing 7608 electors South Ward

2 Councillors representing 4687 electors



There are a number of legislative requirements to be complied with in the process of reviewing the issue of Councillor numbers and their relevance to the community.

One of these requirements is that a Council must be represented by at least six Councillors and no more than 15 Councillors, which includes the position of Mayor. Given that the Council currently consists of 14 Councillors, with a District population of some 65,000, there can only be an increase of one additional Councillor, even though the population of Cockburn is likely to increase by another 50,000 in the next 20 years. On the face of it, these figures suggest that the District is currently over represented by elected members as a proportion of the residential population.

Furthermore, Council's current allocation of 14 Councillors is distributed amongst 5 Wards roughly in proportion to the number of electors in each Ward at present. This, of course, will change as the population increases in the newly created residential areas in future.

"This scenario suggests that the current Ward representation is in excess of the needs of current population, given that there is room to allocate only one further Councillor position to the current number overall," City of Cockburn's Chief Executive Officer Rod Brown said.

"Therefore, the timing of such a review of representation is appropriate. However, in considering this review, it is essential to obtain customer's views in order to ensure the decision to be made takes into account the community's wishes," he said.

Accordingly, Council has engaged the services of a marketing consultancy to conduct a widespread survey of the District in order to ascertain how, and how many, elected representatives should be elected to the City of Cockburn.

The random survey will seek the views of a cross section of the community on this and related issues, such as postal voting and the method of electing the Mayor.

The survey, due to commence in August 1999, will be undertaken by telephone and will involve a 5-minute interview.

Wood heater tips

ood heaters can be an effective way of heating your home, but if they are not operated properly excessive amounts of smoke can be produced that may cause a nuisance to neighbours and also contribute to Perth's haze problem.

So here are some handy tips from City of Cockburn's Health Services that will help you maximise your wood heater's efficiency, and also prevent pollution problems.

- Always use dry, well-seasoned wood as fuel. It is also preferable that you use hardwoods such as jarrah, rather than softwoods like pine. The use of dry, well-seasoned hardwoods will also prevent creosote build-up in the chimney flue, a flammable substance that can cause chimney fires.
- Store your firewood in a dry, well-ventilated place. Dry wood generates about 50% more heat than green wood, so it makes sense to ensure that your wood is dry.
- Keep the air controls open at all times. Don't build a large fire then allow it to smoulder, as this starves it of oxygen and creates large amounts of smoke. Build smaller fires more regularly and keep it burning at a high or moderate rate.
- Never burn painted or chemically treated woods or particle board, and don't use your heater as an incinerator for household rubbish.
- When buying a wood heater, make sure you buy one that is the right size. If the heater is too large for the room it is heating, the air controls will have to be turned down and this will result in decreased heater efficiency, creosote build-up and smoke problems.
- Check your chimney periodically. A fire should only smoke when it is first lit. If is continues to smoke, this indicates that the heater may be inefficient and requires more careful operation.
- Most wood heaters are sold with "chinaman's caps" on the chimney flue to stop rain getting in. However, they prevent the upward flow of air and force the smoke outwards and in some cases down. The flue can be fitted with a venturi cowl or parallel rain excluder, which keeps rain out but allows smoke to continue travelling upwards

Watsonia and Watsons are among the few names known to all West Australians for generations.

The firm's founder, William Watson, opened his first luncheon room in Fremantle in 1895. His business grew because he sold quality product at a reasonable price, and soon he had 11 outlets throughout the metropolitan area.

Mr Watson moved to the present Watsonia site in Spearwood in 1909 where he used the latest technology - including a sausage machine

powered by a horse - to produce his smallgoods.

In the 90 years since that historic move, Watsonia in Spearwood has carried on its founder's tradition of providing quality and value.



he City of Cockburn was announced Runner Up in the prestigious nation wide "Banksia Environmental Foundation Awards" for its new Leachate Treatment Plant at the Henderson Landfill Site. The awards were hosted in Melbourne's Grand

Adam Spencer. Thousands of nominations were sent in from throughout Australia for these awards.

"We were extremely proud to be named finalists and make the top three of the innovation category," City of Cockburn's Waste Services Engineer Rob Jack said. The innovation category was won by Coca-Cola Amatil for a proposed plastics recyclable resin.

The treatment plant at Henderson is the first of its kind in Australia and was constructed to optimise protection of the environment at the landfill site, which is now in its ninth year of operation.

"Protecting the environment was the City's Waste Services principle goal in the construction and operation of this facility. To this end the waste cells have been lined with a high Density Polyethylene (HDPE) barrier and adequate drainage to ensure any leachate arising from the decomposition of waste is collected and transferred to a central processing point," Mr Jack said.

In the past this involved storage and evaporation over the drier months. However in August 1998, the City of Cockburn commissioned a number of trials in order to evaluate the performance of various technologies available for treating leachate at the Henderson Landfill Site.

Consultants Halpern Glick Maunsell were commissioned to evaluate the respective trial results and prepare appropriate documentation on behalf of the City, to allow for tendering of an automated waste water treatment plant.

Tenders were called and following a review, QED Australia Pty Ltd was selected as the successful tenderer. The Henderson Landfill leachate is one of the most notorious influents to treat due to the variable nature of its contaminants, according to Doug Miller of OED. This means the influent can vary dramatically in its biological content each day.

"Cockburn's chosen processing plant involved three phases of treatment; the primary phase involved chemical flocculation and physical separation; followed by secondary and tertiary phases.

QED's tender proposal introduced the Company's Australian patented Tangential Flow Technology System (QTFS) as the primary phase treatment.

This was followed by the secondary phase treatment, which incorporates QED Biofixations and fine bubble aeration, developed by QED, in conjunction with the Pasteur Institute of France.

The final tertiary phase treatment involves micro filtration and sterilisation, prior to transfer of the treated water to irrigate a 2.2-hectare native tree plantation at the southern end of the landfill site.

The Henderson Landfill leachate treatment plant is capable of processing 120m3 of raw leachate per day to an acceptable prescribed quality set by the Water and Rivers Commission
