### **Landowner Biodiversity Conservation Grants** now open



THE City of Cockburn is unique in that it has several rural zones within the metropolitan area — and grants of up to \$3000 are available to help preserve them.

Landowners with significant remnant bushland or wetland areas on their properties are encouraged to apply for Landowner Biodiversity Conservation Grants.

The 2010 grant round is now open for residents living in rural, rural living and resource zones, helping to preserve the quality and extent of the natural environment in the area.

Funds will be granted to landowners to assist with weed control, revegetation, dieback management and various conservation projects.



# Disability Access and Inclusion Plan: helping the community

Almost 19 per cent of Cockburn residents have a disability — and the City of Cockburn is committed to going beyond legislative requirements to assist residents with disabilities in any way it can, in a bid to make their lives easier.

Documents (such as *Cockburn Soundings*) can be requested in alternative formats and people can go on a register to receive them by emailing customer@cockburn.wa.gov.au.

The City also makes use of the National Relay Service, a phone solution for people with hearing or speech impairments, whenever people call and may need assistance.

Soon-to-be installed is a large display screen at the City of Cockburn's main reception area, providing another way for people to view and access information.

Ensuring people with disabilities can access facilities and participate in activities is a priority for the City. People with concerns should contact Disability Access and Inclusion Officer Paul Gabbert on 9411 3502.

It is a requirement of Disability Services Act 1993 that all local governments have a Disability Access and Inclusion Plan.

The City of Cockburn's plan lists strategies to ensure people with disabilities have the same opportunities to access all services provided by the council, so they are included like other community members.

#### Local government reform: Cockburn in a strong position

Following Local Government Minister John Castrilli's announcement of wide-ranging reform earlier this year, the City of Cockburn has approached the matter carefully and constructively.

A report presented to a special meeting of council in August highlighted how the City had engaged with its neighbours to promote reform — but did not find a partner for voluntary amalgamation. Both the City of Fremantle and Town of Kwinana previously rejected Cockburn's approach.

The City of Cockburn's report noted the importance for industry reform, particularly from a financial perspective, and demonstrated the economic value of larger local governments because of their ability to achieve economies of scale.

Cockburn was highlighted as a strong, financially sustainable entity with 20 years of growth still ahead. The City has made a substantial contribution in delivering social and community services across the broader southern metropolitan area, as well as generating numerous employment opportunities.

When considering the need for boundary adjustments, the City of Cockburn was generally satisfied with current

arrangements, but does not support any splitting up of Cockburn as this would have an impact on the City's own sustainability and would disadvantage residents.

The City considered it would be better for smaller councils to consider merging with their neighbours, if they sought to change their boundaries in order to increase their population and improve their financial sustainability.

As a result of the special meeting, the Council decided to again approach the City of Fremantle to consider voluntary amalgamation. This has the potential to deliver significant financial and economic benefits to both communities. It was also an option that had been more strongly favoured by the community during the public consultation period.

Council also resolved to reject the request from the City of Melville to cede a portion of Leeming. The City of Cockburn's Leeming residents make good use of council services and boundary change would lead to higher rates and charges for those residents.

Minister Castrilli will be invited to visit the City of Cockburn to hear from Elected Members firsthand on the City's vision for the future.





#### North Coogee Foreshore Update



Stage One of the City's North Coogee Foreshore Management Plan has been completed. The City is committed to managing and rehabilitating the North Coogee foreshore and has undertaken a number of works over the past few months to improve the aesthetic of the area and maintain its natural environment.

#### These include:

- Dune rehabilitation works and plantings have been upgraded between the Island Street groyne and Rollinson Road car park.
- Cleanup refurbishments including new coastal conservation fencing and 5500 plantings from Rollinson Road to McTaggart Cove along C Y O'Connor beach are complete.
- This also included maintenance works to the "Human Race" sculptured walkway by artist Tony Jones, to commemorate the Robb Jetty and cattle industry activities at this location. As part of the upgrade along CY O'Connor Beach, the race has been refurbished (rust proofed and repainted) and the pathways have been upgraded with new limestone.


The next stages are being designed for the reconstruction of the Catherine Point groyne, refurbishment of the Rollinson Road car park and picnic area with recreation facilities.







#### Bibra Lake Management Plan: work under way



Work is progressing on implementing the multimillion dollar *Bibra Lake Landscape*, *Recreational and Environmental Management Plan*, adopted in May, to ensure the lake and surrounds are protected into the future.

The City of Cockburn's commitment to sustainability is clear in this long-term plan for conserving the environment, promoting educational resources and maintaining one of Cockburn's most popular reserves.

The goal is to make Bibra Lake the best wetland precinct in Perth, readily enjoyed by old and young, with a range of quality community facilities and services to enhance the conservation values of the reserve.

New pathways in the north eastern bushland and on the southern and western side of the lake have been completed, providing shaded access to "view windows" of the surrounding environment. Secondary paths provide for slower-pace walkers along the lake fringes, allowing other pedestrians and cyclists a faster-paced route on the outer edge of the reserve. Weed control and revegetation is underway on the east side of the lake form the northern swamp, towards the bird hide and boardwalk. Re-contouring of the southern banks was completed in June.

Several aspects of the plan have been deemed as major priorities and will take place over the next year, including new boardwalks, completion of walkways and cycleways, interpretive and information installations, new play and recreational facilities and continued protection and enhancement of the natural environment.

Further community engagement is aimed at people being healthy dog owners, wetland education programs, protecting fauna habitats from people and animals wandering off paths.

A project working group was formed at the start of the planning process, involving key stakeholders and community organisations. The plan was advertised extensively for public comment before work began.

#### Get charged for battery recycling

Ever wondered what to do with old household batteries once the charge has run out? Throwing them in the bin is an environmental no-no — but help is at hand.

The City of Cockburn and Southern Metropolitan Regional Council have started a dry cell battery recycling program to help residents recycle their household batteries the right way.

There are five drop-off points at Coolbellup Library, Spearwood Library, Success Library, Phoenix Shopping Centre and Cockburn Gateway Shopping Centre.

Types of batteries accepted – usually found in everyday items such as radios, cameras, and children's toys – include AA and AAA cells (single-use batteries), C and D-sized batteries, button batteries (from watches) and nine-volt and six-volt batteries.

#### Keeping Australia Beautiful

As part of Keep Australia Beautiful Week from August 24 to 30, students from Success Primary School were taken on a tour of the Regional Resource Recovery Centre in Canning Vale to see recycling in action.

Operated by the Southern Metropolitan Regional Council, it was an opportunity for them to see first-hand what happens to waste once it is collected from their bins and how it can be recycled into other products for further use, such as compost.

Despite a fire at the RRRC in June that destroyed one of the recycling facilities, plastics, paper, glass and other materials collected in yellow-topped bins continue to be recycled through an alternative service. The RRRC tour provided the Success Primary students with a valuable insight into how to recycle right and why it's important to put the right items in the correct bin.

Following their visit, they collected 15 bags of rubbish and numerous cardboard boxes and metal. The main items collected were soft drink cans and water bottles, along with building rubbish such as cement bags, plastic wrap and plastic string from pallets.

They also took part in a wetlands sampling activity, finding numerous macro-invertebrates such as water snails, water fleas, water spiders and water beetles.



#### Thanks Lotterywest!

A \$4.8 million project to redevelop and expand facilities in Coolbellup to create a community hub has recently been awarded a \$1,149,200 Lotterywest Service Accommodation and Community Facility Grant.

The Coolbellup Community Hub will be a multi-functional and accessible facility that includes community activity and meeting spaces, matched with childcare, family, financial, vocational training and library services.

The City of Cockburn plans to upgrade the Coolbellup Library, Centenary Hall and surrounding City offices to

consolidate Coolbellup's current community facilities and social services into a more efficient "one-stop shop".

The Lotterywest funding will be specifically used for public meeting and children's activity areas, children's services landscaping and play areas, fencing, gates, footpaths and paved areas, loose furniture and equipment.



#### Environmental initiative up for Premier's Award

The City of Cockburn's Environmental Education Initiatives Project has been named a finalist in the 2009 Premier's Awards for Excellence in Public Sector Management.

Recognised in the Managing the Environment Category, the project is a flexible tool assisting schools, teachers and community members to deliver environmental education on sustainability.

The primary school program themes of biodiversity, greenhouse gases, resource use and liveable communities are designed to assist students to develop life skills that will protect and enhance their local environment.

Community members can gain assistance and knowledge by participating in the landowner biodiversity conservation grants, community natural resource management and sustainable living workshops, the 'Men of the Trees' community volunteer planting scheme and revegetation programs.

#### **Recreation** Update...



Work on the Success Regional Community and Recreation Facility is well underway! The tilt panels for the clubrooms have been erected and the slab and structural works are soon to follow. The netball courts have been graded and limestone has been compacted on the site of the courts, which are set to be complete in December 2009.

Irrigation and bore contracts are completed on the ovals, and grass planted in late August. The Success Regional Community & Recreation Facility is coming along well and is anticipated to be complete by March 2010.

#### Be a good neighbour, not a noisy neighbour

The City of Cockburn is reminding residents to be mindful of noise levels coming from their homes, so they can maintain good relations with their neighbours.

Whether planning a party, engagement, housewarming or birthday, some simple guidelines include:

- Letting neighbours know about parties in advance and providing them with your number to call if they feel the noise is too loud.
- Turning music down at 10pm and off at midnight or to a level not audible at your neighbour's boundary (this is a guideline only and should be discussed with your neighbours).
- Listening for noise at fence boundaries during the party and keeping amplified music indoors.
- Asking everyone to move inside after midnight to prevent loud voices disturbing neighbours.
- Leaving cleanup until morning so clanging bottles don't disturb neighbours.
- Asking guests to leave quietly and say their goodbyes inside.

Noise emissions are controlled by state regulations, allowing authorised noise officers from the city – along with police officers – to issue infringements. Noise associated with anti-social behaviour cannot be handled by the City's authorised noise officers and should be referred to the police.
