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## It's official! We're getting BIGGER

THE Australian Bureau of Statistics has recently released the demographic results from the 1991 Census.

The population of the City of Cockburn at August 6, 1991, was 50,830 (including 954 visitors). Sixty-eight per cent of the population is under the age of 40 and there are 46 senior citizens over the age of 90.

Females only marginally outnumber males (25,334 females, 25,042 males).

It has been estimated that the current population of the City has increased to approximately 51,500 since the census date.

During the next 30 years, it is anticipated that the population of Cockburn will double to more than 100,000. Major areas of urban growth are projected for Jandakot and Yangebup. Smaller residential sub-divisions will continue to be developed in Bibra Lake, South Lake, Leeming and Spearwood.

## A TIE, AND TWO NEW FACES AFTER POLL

THE 1992 Local Government elections were held on Saturday, May 2, with voting taking place to fill vacancies in four wards: West, North, Coastal and South.

Eleven polling booths were open from 8am. The counting of votes, including early, absent and postal votes, took place at the Council Administration Centre. Counting was completed by 8.30pm.

The results of the elections were:

WEST WARD: John McNair.

NORTH WARD: Nola Waters.

COASTAL WARD: Joe Ostojich.

SOUTH WARD: Terry Battalis.

The count this year resulted in a tie for West Ward. This is the first time in 40 years of local government that the Returning Officer has encountered such a situation. Under Section 136 of the Local Government Act the retiring councillor, John McNair, was declared elected.

Voting at local government elections is not compulsory, resulting in the following percentage figures for votes received:

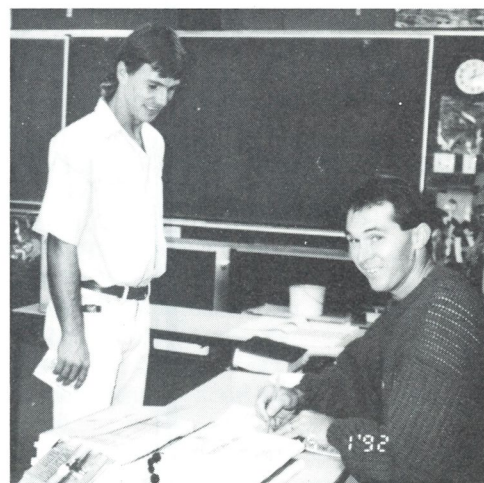
WEST WARD: 11%.

NORTH WARD: 10.29%.

COASTAL WARD: 23.66%.

SOUTH WARD: 16.72%.

The swearing-in ceremony was held on Monday, May 4 when the newly-elected

councillors took their oath of allegiance, and formally accepted the duties and role of a councillor.

The following evening, at the first meeting of Council after the elections, Councillors elected Cllr Don Miguel as Mayor, and Cllr Ray Lees as Deputy Mayor for the 1992-93 year.

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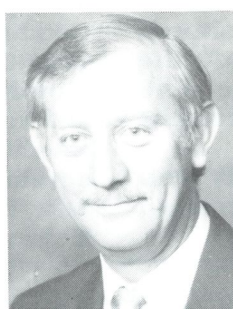
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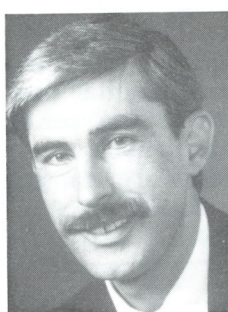

## By-pass: Now it's up to the Minister

THE objection period for the deletion of the extension of Stirling Highway (known as the Fremantle Eastern By-Pass Road), has closed and the Minister for Planning will adjudicate in the near future.

Objections to the deletion were submitted by:

City of Cockburn (population 51,500)  
Town of Kwinana (pop. 17,000)  
City of Melville (pop. 90,000)  
City of Rockingham (pop. 44,000)  
Fremantle Port Authority  
Fremantle Chamber of Commerce  
West Australian Road Transport Association  
RAC

The following reports specifically commissioned to look at transportation in the region do not recommend the deletion of the Fremantle Eastern By-Pass Road:

Road Reserve Review Committee (1991)  
Fremantle Traffic Calming and Port Access Study (1992)  
South West Metropolitan Planning Study (1992)

The City of Fremantle (pop. 24,000) and the Town of East Fremantle (pop. 6,400) support the deletion of the road.

Organisations and reports which support its retention believe that the road is essential for regional traffic movement and that trucks, port traffic and inter-district traffic need a road system separate from existing residential streets.

# RECYCLING: SAVE IT,

A BLUEPRINT for recycling is being prepared by the State Government's Department of Resources to supplement kerbside collection.

Recycling involves:

- \* Waste minimization
- \* Collection of recyclables
- \* Sorting and treatment of recyclables
- \* Purchase of recyclable materials
- \* Sale of recyclable materials

At present, recycling is not profitable and is heavily subsidized.

The community has to be committed to the full cycle for it to be effective.

Waste minimization is the first step. Buy a compost bin and place all organic food stuffs, grass cuttings etc in the bin to reduce waste volume and use in the garden.

Ensure you buy products in containers that can be re-cycled. In time, it is hoped that Council will provide information on manufacturers who supply their products in re-usable containers.



## Collection of Recyclables

This is integrally connected to who wants to buy products, and in what form. We have no influence over this aspect of recycling, but the Government is committed to negotiating and encouraging the sale of these products.

## Sorting of Collectables

This is a labour intensive operation, forming a major part of the contractor's costs. There are proposals for a region of councils to form their own sorting warehouses.

Residents can help by ensuring that materials placed for collection are in their proper receptacles.

Beware of contamination because buyers of papers do not want it. Mixing glass and paper is also unacceptable.

## Treatment of Material

Material that has been collected has to be sorted and treated. Paper, for instance, needs to have the ink removed before re-use.

# SEND IT AND DON'T FORGET TO BUY IT

This is a significant cost, which can be sustained only by a constant supply of recycling material. Help the recycling effort by committing yourself to save material for collection on a regular basis.

## Purchase of Recyclables

This relies on the businesses and the entrepreneurs of the world to invest in the treatment of recyclable materials to produce useful products.

Notable examples of effective recycling are being carried out by Paper and Pulp International, which is producing egg cartons from recycled paper; and Moltoni Corporation, which is recycling building materials.

Other schemes being proposed will need encourage-

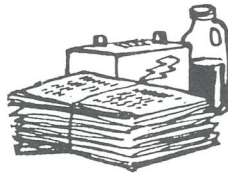
ment and possibly subsidies from the taxpayer before they become viable.

## Sale of Recyclables

This final stage is a most important issue. Products made from recycled materials must be purchased by the community in order for the cycle to continue.

If the community is committed to the concept and buys recycled products, rather than materials which have not been recycled, the entire process can be sustained.

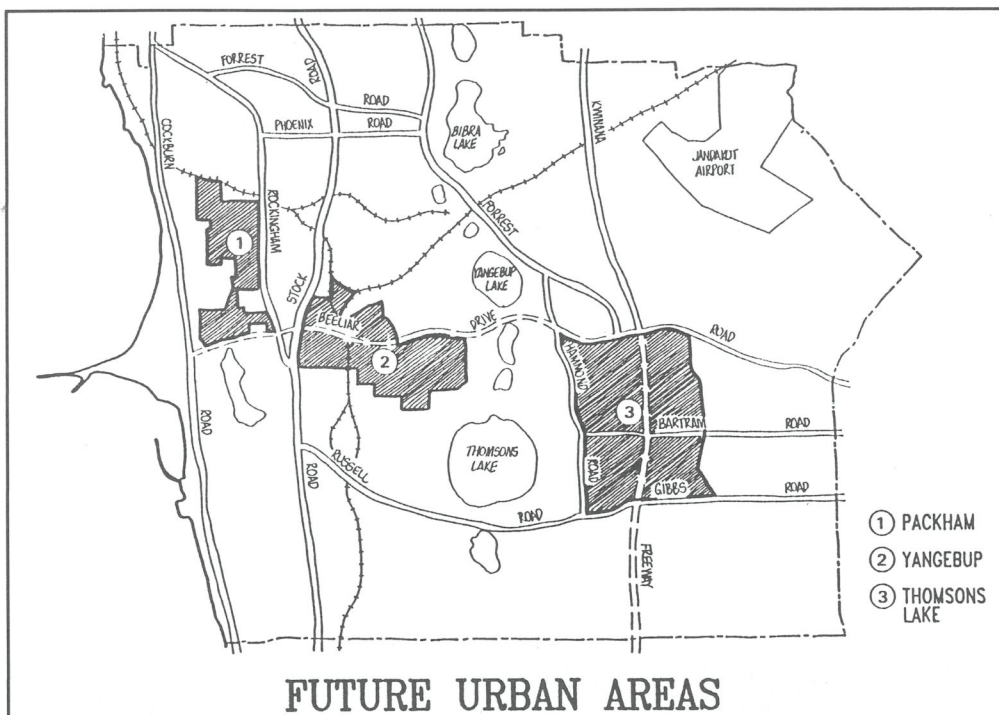
There's a saying that a chain is only as strong as its weakest link. Let's all make sure that, as individuals, we do our best to strengthen that recycling chain.

# OTTEY CENTRE WANTS TO HEAR FROM YOU

THE South Lake Ottey Family Centre is located at 2a South Lake Drive, South Lakes. The Centre has been developed as a multi-purpose facility to meet a variety of community needs.

At present there are two major activities at the Centre.

- \* Four-year-old kindergarten
- \* 0 to three-year-old playgroup

Children may attend the four-year-old programme in the year they turn four. There are two sessions a week, 9am-11.15am or 1pm-3.15pm. Cost is \$42 per 10-week term. Subsidies are possible on application.

Playgroup is one session per week, at present 9.30am-11.30am Monday to Thursday.

The Centre is flexible and provides rooms that may be hired or utilized to run activities of interest to the community.

It is important that the Family Centre responds to the needs of the people who use it, so the involvement of the community is vital to all aspects of the programmes organised at the Centre.

## POOL PROBE GOING WELL

SWIMMING pool safety inspections are going well with more than 1250 of 1750 pools scrutinised. More than 2200 pool visits have been made altogether.

Inspections at Coolbellup, North Lake, Bibra Lake, South Lake, Spearwood, Henderson and Success have been completed. Yangebup, Hamilton Hill and Wattleup inspections are proceeding with Leeming, Coogee, Munster and Jandakot to come.

The great majority of people have been most helpful in complying with pool safety advice.

Council's regular pool inspector, Mike Ward, says he is grateful to all those people who have helped him and he feels lucky in that only two dogs have had a taste of his leg.

## Compost boost

A positive response from ratepayers has allowed Council to proceed with the purchase of high-quality, cone type compost bins at cost price.

The bins are available to City of Cockburn residents on a first-come, first-served basis from Council offices. Price is \$38 Black, \$40 Green.

## REQUEST FOR BUS DRIVERS

THE City of Cockburn runs two After School Centres, one at Spearwood Pre-Primary and the other at South Lakes Pre-Primary. These centres are designed to care for primary aged children when parents are unable to be with them between 3pm and 6pm.

A planned extension to this service will include children from Bibra Lake and MacKillop Primary Schools.

Transport to the South Lakes Centre for these children will be on the City's own bus.

If you hold a B, C or F-class driver's licence and could volunteer your services it would be greatly appreciated. Drivers are needed for every school day from approximately 2.45pm to 3.30pm. Volunteers, particularly males, are

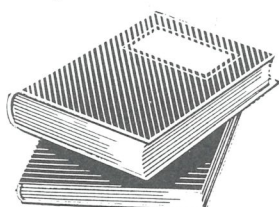
desperately needed to assist the running of the group on a roster basis.

- Swimming lesson enrolment — July 13-July 17

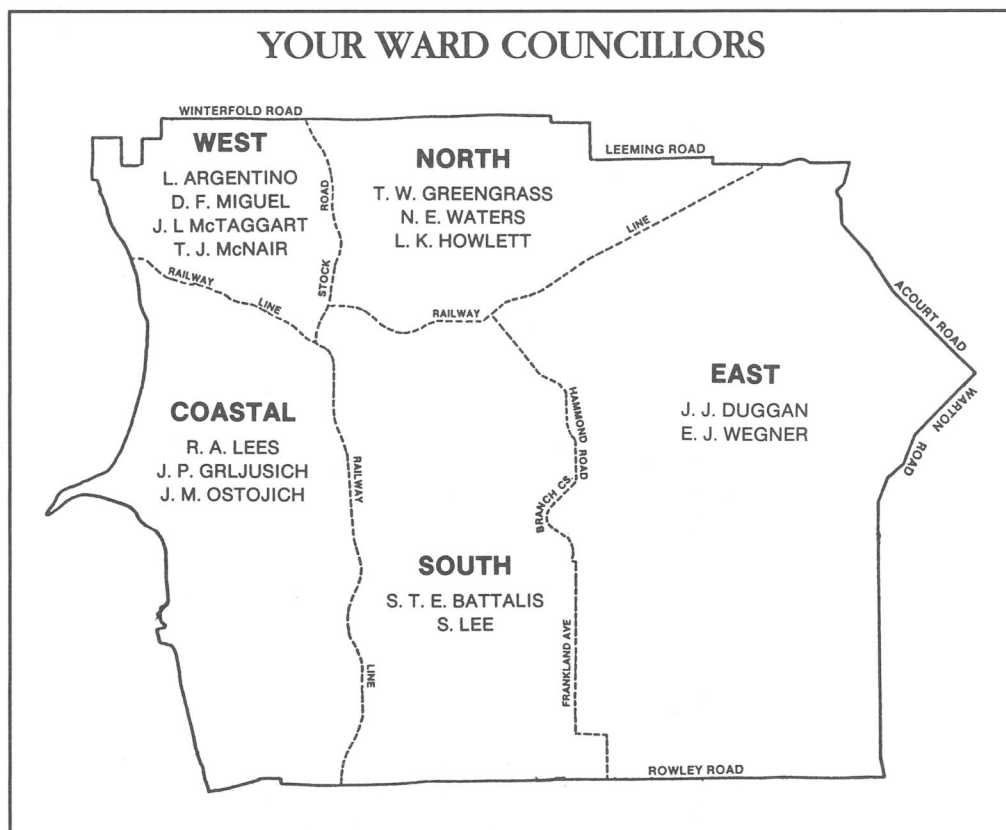


Classes include 0-2 years, 2-4 years, stages 1-8 and adults
