

It may be that people have attended due to the "scare" tactics of the local press inferring that the Commissioners are not fairly representing the local community. Now however, members of that same community, are delighted to find that we are no different in how we operate in terms of actually making decisions than their elected councillors.

We still have to look at all applications, which have complied with all the requirements; we still ask for all the information relevant to the Local Government Act and council by-laws and we certainly take into account public reaction and response.

The Commissioners are acutely aware of the need to follow legal process and to be fair towards all parties. It is essential that everyone remember that while we are here it is "business as usual" and council decisions must be made and implemented on behalf of the whole community.

The fact is that while businesses own property within the council area and want to develop their property, then they are entitled the make application in exactly the same way as people opposing that application have the right to lobby Council to reject the application.


The fact remains though, that applications have to be given due


consideration according to all the laws, by-laws, statutes etc. If they are not, then the applicants certainly would have the right to appeal and to doubt that "due process" would transpire.

Frank said. "I can then make sure the Council is aware of these concerns and come up with a solution".

Frank has first-hand knowledge of the challenges and opportunities available to the disabled, having suffered from Cerebral Palsy since birth.

He comes to the City of Cockburn with a proven business background in sales, marketing and promotion. The most recent as a marketing consultant for several retirement villages in Western Australia.

First hand knowledge coupled with an experienced working history, Frank is well equipped to fulfil his new position and to assist the Councils Disability Advisory Committee which consists of dedicated parents of families with disabilities.

- Representation of Council on local community services forums and groups which aim to identify and or address disability service needs;
- To assist individuals and groups experiencing difficulty gaining access to council facilities and services;
- Maintain liaison with various state/federal government instrumentalities particularly in relation to disability service matters;
- Assist community groups to analyse and address their needs;
- Assist other staff in the social services team to review, design and develop programs and policies addressing disability-related matters.

ENVIRONMENTAL UPDATE

City of Cockburn MILES AHEAD!

Cities for Climate Protection™ Australia, is a program which assists Australian local governments and their communities to achieve sustainable reductions in greenhouse gas emissions. It is an International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives program delivered in collaboration with the Australian Greenhouse Office.

Participation in the program involves completing five milestones.

In November last year, the City of Cockburn was awarded a trophy for completion of Milestone One.

Commissioner Julian Donaldson is pictured

receiving the award from Senator Ian Campbell last November.

Now in January the City of Cockburn received notification that due to the diligent efforts of Environmental Technical Officer, Paddy Strano, we have completed Milestone 2 and will receive an award for that later this year.

This puts us way in front of other local governments in Western Australia!

Paddy Strano is in the spotlight again! As a worldwide Midge expert!

Paddy has just returned from a trip to Hawaii where he'd been asked to offer his expertise at a workshop on managing the wetland ecology of the Kealia Pond National Wildlife Refuge on the island of Maui.

The City of Cockburn has an "Integrated Midge

Control Strategy" developed by previous Environmental Manager, Darren Walsh. For the past few years Paddy has been overseeing the implementation of this strategy by examining, delivering and monitoring various methods of midge control within the city's wetland areas.

Things which are known to increase midge levels such as; water quality and water levels are two factors being

looked at as long term measures to manage the midge. Chemical treatment is used during periods of midge proliferation and buffer zones are being revegetated where possible to screen wetlands from residential areas.

In some areas within our city region in peak midge season midge numbers have been assessed at 40-50,000 per square metre. Other areas which have been less affected by pollution and other known contributors, numbers are much less at about 4,000/ m², which is considered to be normal in this area for midge population.

Paddy seemed amused that they thought they had a problem. "They have about 400 midge per square metre in the Kealia Ponds area. But their problem is

just starting, so it is good that they are looking at control options at this early stage."

Paddy was keen to give them advice on what we had tried that had produced effective results and was also able to talk about the impact of various kinds of

> chemical treatments on other wildlife such as frogs. He also offered that action now to limit the causes of increased numbers of midge would be the most effective form of control.

Kealia Ponds is about 120 hectares of wetlands which is surrounded by sugar growing areas. It's only since condominium complexes have been developed along the shores, that midge have

been considered a problem.

Part of the workshop was devoted to a public meeting attended by residents of the condominiums and Paddy was able to answer questions from the public with expertise gained here in the City of Cockburn.

Paddy was asked where he would like to next advise on midge control ... "Venice!" he said. "The problem there is enormous. Sometime freeways approaching Venice have to be closed because visibility is limited by clouds of midge."

It would seem that much of the research done by Paddy and other Australians leads the world in this area ... so the City of Cockburn today - and who know where Paddy may be trying to solve midge problems tomorrow.

Striving for excellence in customer service, the City of Cockburn has recently appointed a Bookings Officer responsible for the booking of all sporting reserves, local/district sporting facilities, community and recreation halls.

Bev Nelson (lower front), the new Bookings Officer, is aiming to create a more efficient booking system to assist the community as effectively as possible.

John Gregg, Manager Social Services, said the City of Cockburn are "looking at a centralised booking system which will allow our customers to make one call to find out what facilities / venues are available in their local area".

"Previously, Andrew Ward, our Recreation Services Officer and Yvonne Coyne the Community Development Officer were coordinating the bookings. These two workers were often 'out and about' in the community, which meant delays and frustration for people trying to make bookings or just obtaining information. We have quite a number of regular users of our facilities and they will now also have a contact who is more readily available".

"With Bev available to coordinate the bookings we believe we will be providing a more efficient and effective service to our residents".

MAJOR UPGRADE OF WATER AND AIR QUALITY

The South Lake Leisure Centre's Indoor pool is to have a major water filtration refurbishment. Preparation work will commence in February 2000, with the closure of the indoor pool necessary between the 10th April and 25th June 2000.

To accommodate the indoor pool being closed, the Centre will be upgrading the outside pools by heating the water and enclosing this area with marquees. This will allow swim lessons, water aerobics and some general public swimming to con-

The spas, sauna, gymnasium, floor aerobics, stadium competitions and 'dry' programs / courses will be unaffected by the indoor pool being closed.

Why does the pool need refurbishing?

The current pool filtration system is able to cope with only a certain number of swimmers. Current facility users will already be aware that water quality deteriorates very quickly in periods of high usage.

The upgraded filtration system will able to cope with more than twice the number of swimmers, while maintaining the highest standard of water quality and clarity.

To achieve the increased filtration, a new water feature will be added to the children's play area that will include small slides, water fountains and waterfalls.

Water quality will be significantly improved, as well as a reduction in the chlorine smell normally associated with many indoor heated pools.

Term Two Swimming, With a Difference...

Pirates, tropical islands, piranhas, lost treasure... Sound like an adventure movie? No, It's term two swimming lessons at the South Lake Leisure Centre.

The Centre will be upgrading the outside pools by heating the water and enclosing the area with marquees. This will allow swim lessons, water aerobics and some general public swimming to continue while work on the inside pool is being com-

Stage five classes and above have been designed using the outside pools, which includes a waterfall, three main pool areas, a flowing river, a giant mushroom and two bridges.

The main focus of these new classes is to have fun and enjoyment in the pool while learning water techniques and becoming familiar with different scenarios in the water.

A huge treasure hunt is being planned for students who have to use different swimming techniques to get to the next clue until they find the treasure but if someone gets caught by a shark the class has to use proper rescuing methods to save them and to guide them through the water to safety.

Games such as the treasure hunt will ensure the students will have a good time while learning the necessary swimming skills and achieving a great level of water awareness.

The huge marquees which are being erected over the main swimming pools outside, will protect swimmers and spectators from any weather conditions and will provide the perfect atmosphere for any upcoming lessons and aqua aerobics.

Seating will be provided for parents who would like to watch their children during their lessons, and all dry activities inside the centre will not be changed.

South Lakes ratio of one teacher to five children will be maintained, although classes will now be combined to include two teachers to ten children which will provide greater supervision and support for students in the pool.

For fun in the pool, quality teaching, exciting and varied lessons Term Two at South Lakes Leisure Centre is a must.


BULK WASTE COLLECTION DATES
