"Manning Park's Newest Attraction"



A universal playground is the newest attraction in Manning Park, Azelia Road, Hamilton Hill. Already home to the Azelia Ley Homestead museum, the Sunset Concerts, and the Spring Fair, Manning Park is one of Cockburn's treasures. This wonderful recreation area now includes a universal playground, which is accessible and inclusive, encouraging children with and without disabilities to play together.

Council's Disability Advisory Committee initiated the playground with all funding for the project,

\$110,000, coming from Cockburn Council. A broad consultation process was undertaken in the lead up to this playground being established.

The vision for the Manning Park universal playground is for it to be an accessible, inclusive playground where children of all abilities can play together. Equipment is aimed at independent access and use, with only some elements requiring access with limited support and assistance from others.

Accessible play areas are also vital for parents and carers with disabilities, who wish to supervise and interact with their children while they play.

Children with mobility related disabilities can gain access and move around the play equipment using ramps and transfer platforms while a firm rubber ground surface enables wheelchairs and other aids to be brought right up to the equipment so play panels are easy to reach. A range of sensory experiences including tactile and visual stimulation has been provided to enhance the enjoyment of play for all children, including children with sensory

impairments or intellectual disabilities.

"The attention to detail and ability to understand how children of various disabilities and/or chronic illness might enjoy the equipment is impressive. Certainly, all our kids didn't want to come home," said Julie Guilfoile, who, along with family and friends, got a preview of the playground with Mayor Stephen Lee, and Council's Children's Services Coordinator, Jill Zumach.

Mayor Stephen Lee will officially open the Manning Park Universal Playground at 2:30 pm on Sunday 14 March 2003. With the near by Azelia Ley Homestead open, and fun and activities planned from 1:00pm – 4:00pm it will be a great afternoon for the whole family.

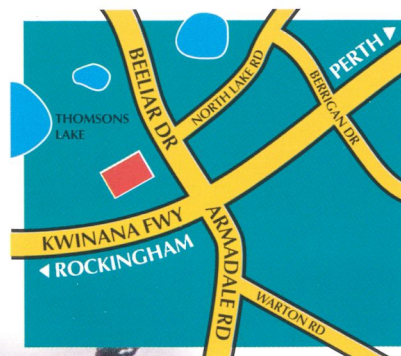

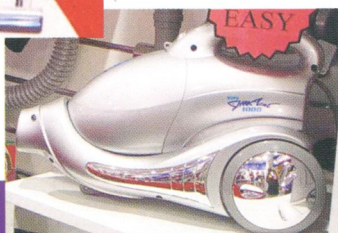

Give it Back!

One of the great things about living in the City of Cockburn is its diversity, both in its people and its environs. The people of Cockburn have always been great helpers, not only in their neighbourhood but also in the wider community. One of the most recognizable, in their yellow overalls, is the Volunteer Bushfire Brigades of Jandakot and South Coogee.

Both these volunteer groups have over 30 members and have been running for over 30 years. Jandakot being slightly older, at 35 Years. These volunteers are an invaluable resource in our community.

They not only protect the local community and bushland in times of fire but offer many other services voluntarily. Services such as controlled burns, training and working with the Lakeland's Cadets. However, their most high profile event, for the local children is the Santa run on Christmas morning.

The **Jandakot and South Coogee Volunteers** who are normal working people have made a commitment to give something back to the community. They attended 145 fires in the 2002/03 fire

season and have already attended 29 call outs this season. The volunteers mainly concern themselves with bush fires while the paid fire fighters, in their red trucks, are for house fires. They do on many occasions however join together to fight fires such as the Wandi/Banjup fires of 2003.

The unique environs of Jandakot and Banjup have recently been given a helping hand with the issuing of **Biodiversity Grants** to land owners who want to put some thing back into the **natural environment**. These grants were given out by the City for such projects as weed control, tree planting and placing of nesting boxes. There will be another run of these grants in 6 months.

These are just two examples of the many Cockburn residents who put something back into their community. This helps make our City the best place to live, work and play.

Will You Be Eligible for NHT Funding in 2004?



Through the National Heritage Trust's (NHT) new strategic approach to investing in natural resource management, the South West Catchment Council and the Swan Catchment Council are preparing the regional strategies which will help set the direction of program funding in Cockburn.

These Strategies will form the basis on which all NHT funding will be spent in each region. This may mean \$\$\$ for your group!

Head Lice...Prevention & Treatment



Head lice are tiny parasites that feed on the scalp and live their lives on the human head. The fast moving adult head lice are brown, about 2-3mm long and extremely hard to see. The eggs (nits) are grey-white, about the size of a tiny grain of salt and can also be difficult to see.

The latest research indicates that head lice are spread by direct head-to-head or hair-to-hair contact with another person who has head lice. They DO NOT pose a risk to health and are not a sign of poor health or hygiene.

WHAT ARE THE TREATMENT OPTIONS?

- If you use an insecticide treatment, check the product label for the active ingredient. The three groups of insecticide that have been shown to be effective and safe for use in the treatment of head lice are permethrin, pyrethrin and malathion. Because no insecticide will kill all the eggs, the first treatment should be followed by a treatment 7 days later, and then 14 days after the first treatment to kill any lice that may hatch during this time. As with any pesticide, it is always important to follow the directions for use carefully.

Using an insecticide treatment more than three times, one week apart may cause skin irritation.

- Unfortunately, other chemical or 'natural' treatments have not been properly tested to demonstrate that they are safe and effective for use in the treatment of head lice.
- Using hair conditioner and a nit comb in the 10-day treatment described below is a safe and effective method of treating for head lice. The hair conditioner makes head lice easier to see, makes using the nit comb much easier and eliminates the need to use insecticide.

CHOOSING A NIT COMB

The most effective nit comb to choose is a fine toothed, metal comb with round teeth,

approximately 1mm apart. Whatever type of treatment option you choose, using an appropriate nit comb is absolutely necessary to comb the treatment through and ensure that it works.

HOW DO I USE HAIR CONDITIONER TO TREAT HEAD LICE ?

Using the hair conditioner treatment removes the head lice as they hatch - before they mature to lay more eggs. By using the hair conditioner treatment for the full 10-day period, you can effectively disrupt the life cycle of the head lice, ensuring that no more eggs are laid.

1. Apply plenty of conditioner (any white, generic brand is suitable) to dry hair and comb it through with an ordinary brush or comb to remove any tangles.
2. Thoroughly comb small sections of the hair with the nit comb in each direction - forwards, backwards, left and right. As you comb, wipe the conditioner that is combed from the hair onto a white paper towel and examine it in strong light to see if the dark brown adult lice or light brown immature hatchlings are being removed.
3. When all the hair has been combed, rinse the hair conditioner from the hair and dry it.
4. This process is repeated daily for 10 days to ensure that all the head lice are removed from the hair, as they hatch.

Please note: If adult head lice are found in the hair partway through the 10-day treatment, this indicates a new infestation. To ensure all the head lice are eliminated, the treatment should extend for a further 10 days from the day that the lice are again found in the hair.

Warning - insecticide head lice treatments **should not** be used on:

- Babies under 6 months.
- People with asthma, epilepsy, insecticide allergies, scalp conditions or very sensitive skin.
- Women who are pregnant or breast-feeding.

These groups should use the 10-day hair conditioner treatment instead.

WHEN TREATING HEAD LICE IT IS IMPORTANT TO REMEMBER :

- Head lice cannot jump, swim or fly and cannot survive for long periods away from the scalp. Cleaning the house when your children have head lice IS NOT NECESSARY! Pillowslips may be soiled with debris and droppings from head lice, but because head lice cannot survive in the environment for long periods of time, they are not 'harboured' in towels, bedding or carpet.
- It is important to ensure that the method of treatment that you use **BREAKS THE LIFE CYCLE** of the head lice. Each adult female louse can lay about 6 eggs per day, so missing even one or two lice will continue the cycle of infestation.
- There is **NO PROVEN** "once off" treatment or "repellent" for head lice.
- Remind children to avoid head-to-head contact with other children, for instance when working at the computer in class, and to avoid sharing combs or brushes as these can dislodge adult lice and transport them.

Remember, an itchy head does not necessarily mean head lice, and head lice may not necessarily make your head itch!

Based on the demonstrated effectiveness of hair conditioner for the treatment of head lice and increasing community concern regarding inappropriate or unnecessary exposure to chemicals, the City's Health Service will be phasing out the supply of "Lice Rid" (containing malathion) over the coming months.

As discussed at the ordinary meeting of Council held on 20th June 2000, Council resolved to:

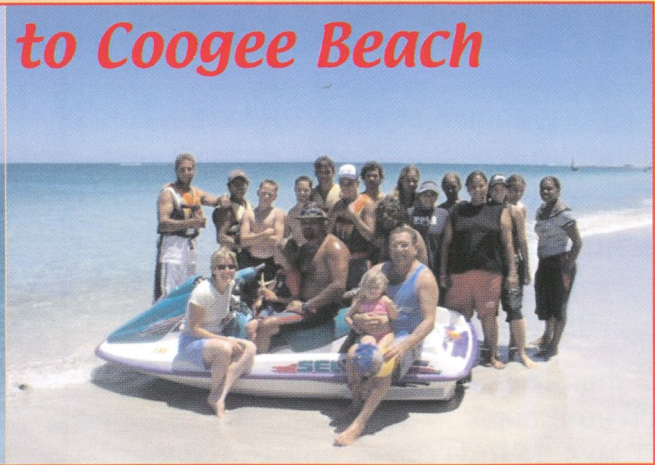
"(2) discontinue the provision of its free immunisation service to residents at Atwell clinic upon the establishment of a General Practitioners surgery in Atwell;"

COUNCIL'S RANGERS

Education & Enforcement

Ever wonder what Council's Rangers do? The rangers deal with a number of issues including, dog registration and control, lost dogs, maintaining Council's dog pound, parking, litter and illegal off road vehicles. Council employs seven full time Rangers who are responsible for the enforcement and administration of a number of state statutes and Council local laws throughout the City of Cockburn.

The administration of these statutes and local laws include investigating complaints, providing public education and awareness and the issue of infringement notices or instigation of prosecutions for non-compliance.

The state legislation administered and enforced by the Rangers include the following:

- ▶ Local Government Act, 1995
- ▶ Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1960
- ▶ Dog Act, 1976 & Regulations
- ▶ Litter Act, 1979 & Regulations
- ▶ Caravan Parks and Camping Grounds Act,

1995 and Regulations 1997

- ▶ Bush Fires Act, 1954 & Regulations

In addition to the state statutes Council Rangers administer and enforce a number of various local laws, which have been adopted by the Council. These local laws encompass diverse issues ranging from parking control & abandoned vehicles to the management of activities in streets and public places.

As well as the seven full time Rangers, Council employs an Administrator and two clerks. Rangers are available:

Monday - Friday

6.00am - 8.00pm (Four Rangers available)


Saturday

8.30am - 5.30pm (Two Rangers available)

Sunday

8.30am - 5.00pm (Two Rangers available)

Rangers are on duty on Public Holidays. After hours calls are diverted to Council's pager service (emergencies only). All non-urgent calls will be dealt with on the next working day.

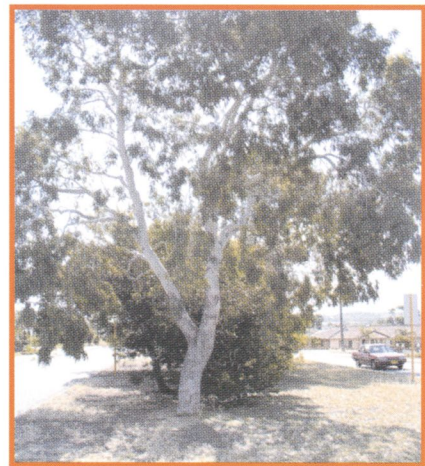

LITTLE RUSH LAKE - REVEGETATION 2003



The Environmental Management Section aims to maintain Cockburn's conservation areas to the highest level for the community. Unfortunately it has come to the City's attention that there has been an increased level of vandalism and general disregard within these areas. These include vandalism of the green tree guards within the revegetation areas of the reserves, dumping of lawn clippings and general garden waste, and planting non-natives in the reserves.

Due to the extensive revegetation program the City places considerable importance on the upkeep of plants within our reserves. Council staff have planted about 17 500 plants this year that need time and care to flourish.

Revegetation maintenance includes weed control around and within the tree guard bags as well as maintaining the guards and stakes to high standards. It can take up to three hours at each reserve, to maintain the plants, and this is without repairing damage to the tree guards. The tree guards are important as they provide a greenhouse atmosphere for the seedlings, which promotes growth, protect the plants from being eaten by rabbits and provides a watering point for our watering contractor.

The dumping of lawn clippings and green waste is not only illegal, but is a continual source of weeds into the reserves. Many weeds that are found in the reserves have originated from gardens and lawns. The City has an ongoing weed-spraying program to manage the weeds, but ultimately prevention is the best policy.

Weeds are also plants that have been intentionally planted in conservation reserves, which are not native to the area. These include: Freesias, Rose Pelargonium, Nasturtiums, Lantana, Victorian Teatrees and many Eastern States Eucalypts. Some local residents are

planting non-native young trees within the reserves. Even though this may seem like the right thing to do it is in fact reducing the native habitat for the bird and animal life in conservation areas. Weed species removed include Prickly Pear, Loquat trees and Eastern States Ribbon Gum. The Environmental Management Section has been vigilant in the removal of these trees from a number of areas, including Yangebup Lake and Little Rush Lake.

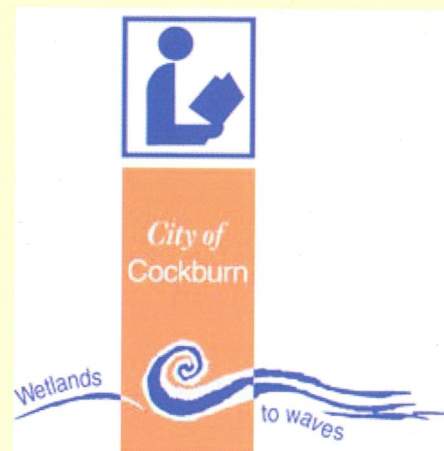
If anyone would like to help with managing these Conservation Areas, there are "Friends Groups" which residents can become a part of. These groups help in revegetation and educate people on the bushland, wetland and community area. If you would like more information on becoming involved with the Friends Group please contact the Environmental Management Section.

COOGEE BEACH - REVEGETATION 2003
