I encourage members of our community to attend this service and to hear the speeches made by students from schools across our district.

On ANZAC Day, Wednesday 25 April, the City of Cockburn RSL Sub Branch will be conducting a dawn service from 5.45am at the Hamilton Hill Memorial and a march and service commencing around 10am at the same venue. Research suggests that mud offers many physical and psychological benefits for children such as an increase in brain activity through use of multiple senses and an increase in physical activity – plus much more.



Nature Play WA CEO Griffin Longley says, "Nature play is all about kids mucking around outside. It is as simple as that. But it is also fundamentally important to the health and wellbeing of every kid. It is as important as eating and sleeping well."

"When kids muck around outside it not only helps their fitness and coordination, it also helps build their immune system, social and emotional development, resilience, creativity and it protects them against mental health disorders. Our kids need time for free play outdoors and to be exposed to nature as much as possible to reach their full potential and most importantly to be happy." Through outdoor unstructured play, children build strength in fitness and resilience, as well as social and emotional skills and creativity.

"Not only is mud fun, it's also good for you!" Griffin says. "Exposure to mud is a great opportunity for kids to engage their senses and experience something new."

Building Our Future: A Connected City

As the City continues to grow, upgrading and developing new infrastructure is key to improving traffic flow, with some major projects underway to address safety and congestion.

The City's annual Community Scorecard Survey demonstrated that traffic remains the number one priority issue for residents and business. To address this, the City continues to prioritise investments in its road programs and advocate for improvements to public transport.

Russell Road - \$1.7m

With funding from the City and the State Government, the intersection of Russell Road and Hammond Road will be reconstructed to create a four-way roundabout.

Spearwood Avenue - \$3.7m

The City is widening Spearwood Avenue in Yangebup from two lanes to four lanes from Beeliar Drive to Yangebup Drive, including the reconstruction of several intersections.

Jandakot Road - \$180k

Under the Black Spot program, a second approach lane will be added on Jandakot Road near Warton Road to serve as a left-turn slip with a give way sign.

Spearwood Avenue - \$173k

Under the Black Spot program, right-turn arrows will be installed at the traffic lights at Spearwood Avenue and Rockingham Road to control right-turns from east and west approaches.

Armadale Road

Due for completion by late 2019, the State Government has started construction to upgrade a 6.9km section of Armadale Road from Tapper Road to Warton Road to a dual carriageway in each direction. Currently used by 27,000 vehicles a day, this will provide better access to new residential developments, Cockburn train station, Cockburn Gateway Shopping Centre and the Jandakot Industrial Area.

Murdoch Drive

The State Government has started construction on the Murdoch Drive Connection which extends Murdoch Drive south from Farrington Road to connect to the Roe Highway and Kwinana Freeway.

More Realistic Plan Urged for Iconic Power Station

The City will ask the State Government to replace plans for full restoration of South Fremantle Power Station with a more financially affordable solution that would halt its deterioration and open it up to the public in the short to medium term.

Landcorp's 2014 redevelopment master plan for the iconic building includes total reconstruction and restoration to the standard of a substantial residential development, plus relocation of the adjacent electricity switching yard.

But the City says full realisation of coastal development in North Coogee between South Beach and Port Coogee will never be realised while the building remains a blight on the landscape because the master plan's financial viability may take several years to be feasible.

The City supports investigating adaptation of the building for use as public space that sensitively and authentically embraces its 34 years as a power station and the past 32 years as an abandoned ruin much-loved by the community which can only access it illegitimately. A City planning report advocates for minimal intervention to the place including stabilisation of the structure and maintaining key sections without the burden of cost that full restoration would demand.

The building's significant fabric would be conserved while the degraded roof structure would be removed, creating flexible spaces to accommodate permanent and non-permanent structures for commercial use such as cafes and shops.

Restoration work would include lighting to showcase the building's cathedral-like spaces, austere interior, raw materials and design, and highlight the urban art for which it has become famous.

The redevelopment would recognise the distinctive landmark's industrial heritage, tracing its lifecycle from a power station to its abandonment and decay.

Green and hard landscaping would add recreational amenity and reflect the site's reclamation by nature and the community.

Some future uses could include playgrounds, outdoor cinema, art displays, BMX events, functions and performances.



Little Green Thumbs Up!

City funding is giving businesses a boost to help young children care for people and the environment.

Teddy Bear Corner has incorporated sustainable practices at its Hamilton Hill day care centre as a result of workshops held by Little Green Steps WA, including composting and worm farming, reducing the waste they produce and the energy they use and have also introduced a Reconciliation Action Plan.

Little Green Steps WA Education Officer Kylie Hosking said the funding had helped the centre offer workshops to local early childhood staff.

"We assist educators to run their service in a way that reduces their ecological footprint and increases their social handprint – including supporting child wellbeing, learning about and incorporating many cultures and contributing to their community."

Kylie said that working with the City has resulted in early childhood services implementing significant changes including reducing water use, introducing vegetable gardening, using 'green cleaning' methods and celebrating cultures.

Cockburn Adopts Its Third Reconciliation Action Plan

The City of Cockburn has adopted its third Reconciliation Action Plan to help Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people achieve equality in all aspects of life.

The City of Cockburn was the first Perth metropolitan Local Government to have a Reconciliation Action Plan endorsed by Reconciliation Australia in 2011.

It is one of just three of WA's 138 local governments embarking on the third phase of developing a RAP, which aims to implement longer-term strategies that achieve equality by using measurable goals and targets.

Some of the actions in the 2018-2021 RAP include establishing an Aboriginal Cultural and Community Centre, developing a policy to increase Aboriginal employment at the City, Aboriginal cultural learning activities for City staff and elected members, and consideration of dual signage and naming of locations with an Aboriginal name.

The plan will also enable the City to

notify the Australian Government of the findings of the Council-endorsed consultation with the Cockburn Aboriginal Reference Group and the wider Aboriginal community about Australia Day activities.

The City will advise the Australian Government that the consultation findings represent the opinion of the Cockburn Aboriginal community, and not the City itself.

It will further advise it does not hold a position on or will debate changing the date of Australia Day until broader consultation with the local non-Aboriginal community on the issue has taken place.

The question of whether the date of the City of Cockburn's Coogee Beach Fest Event should change to a day other than 26 January, will be referred to the City's Community Events Committee for consideration and recommendation to a future Council meeting in the context of developing the City's annual Events Calendar.

Extraordinary Election

Hamilton Hill resident, Kylie Murphy, is a Your Move advocate and rides 4km with her daughters to school.

"We ride to school occasionally. Our son Sam can't ride, so it involves a split drop off. We carpool twice a week with our neighbours so it's not as complex as it sounds. One adult takes the two younger ones in the car and the other adult rides with the two older ones." Schools and workplaces that join Your Move in the City of Cockburn will also have access to free bike courses.
