Let the Games Begin





As the election approaches our time with you is coming to an end. We would like to remind all electors that is very important for the future of your city that you participate in the elections. The postal voting process is very simple and is designed to encourage as many

people as possible to have their say in the future government of their city.

This election involves a postal vote and is being conducted by the Western Australian Electoral Commission. If you have enrolled to vote, sometime after 21 November you will receive your ballot papers in the mail.

You will be voting for a Mayor for the City. There will be seven names on the ballot paper and you are to tick the box next to the name of the person you think should be Mayor. Please do not mark more than one square as this will invalidate your vote.

Opposite there is a brief statement from each of the candidates for Mayor, together with their contact details. You will also have the opportunity to meet them in person and ask them questions at a forum at the Civic Centre on Monday 20 November at 7.30pm.

We have received enough nominations in each of our 3 wards to have an election. Details on the nominees for each ward are on pages 6 and 7.

Once you have made your vote, you should seal it in the reply-paid envelope. The envelope should be endorsed with your name, address, signature and the date. This is required so that you can be marked off on the electoral roll and to check that all votes are valid. The envelope should then be posted to arrive before 6.00pm on 6 December or alternatively you can lodge your envelope in a ballot box at the council offices.

You are not required to vote in person as has been the case in previous elections. Under the postal voting system there is no opportunity to cast a vote in person.

After the close of the polls at 6.00pm, your votes will be counted at the Civic Centre, by Officers from the Electoral Commission. The result of the Mayoral election should be announced shortly after 8.00pm.

Once the newly elected council has held its first formal council meeting, the commissioners role with the City of Cockburn will ceased and we will hand management of the city over to the new Council.

Postal Voting and You

Election Packages for the upcoming council elections will be posted to eligible voters on 21 November. The Western Australian Electoral Commission is sending out 42,000 election packages to voters in the City of Cockburn.

For the December 6 council elections, voters will be selecting three councillors for their ward and everyone will be voting for mayor. It is vital that as many people who are eligible to vote take part in this election. A high voter participation in the election is the best way to ensure the people of Cockburn have a truly representative Council. "We would like everyone to complete their election package and send it in," says Returning Officer Ken Bird.

Completed ballot papers must be returned to the Commission or the Council offices in the envelope provided endorsed with your name, address, signature and date by 6 PM on 6 December. This is a postal vote; there will be no voting in person on the day (i.e. 6 December).

The green ballot paper is for ward councillors, tick no more than three candidates. The blue ballot paper is for mayor, tick only one candidate. If you tick more than three candidates on the green ballot paper or more than one candidate on the blue ballot paper your ballot may be informal.

You must use a tick to indicate which candidate you are voting for. Any other mark, such as underlining, a cross, letters or numbers, will not be counted and your ballot will be invalid.

If you do not receive an election package and feel you are entitled to vote contact the Western Australian Electoral Commission on 9214 0400. According to Mr Bird, "if you believe you are entitled to vote in this election for the City of Cockburn, ask us."

Similarly, if you are uncertain on any aspect of this voting process, please contact Mr Bird, or the Council Office on 9411 3444 for advice.

Life Saving Skills Easy to Learn

As the weather warms up and summer approaches, no doubt parents and children will start spending more time in, near or around water. It's sad to say but every year many young people drown in swimming pools, lakes, dams and rivers throughout the country. However just two hours spent in a resuscitation class can give you the skills needed to save a life, and now is the time to enrol in such a course. "It's too late after the event to do anything," according to South Lake Leisure Centre Swim School Coordinator Lari McDonald.

The Swim School at the South Lake Leisure Centre offers resuscitation classes for ages 8 and up. The courses can be taken at the centre or it can be conducted at your house, work or club. Family groups and social clubs often take part in the resuscitation class. In the class you will learn expired air resuscitation (EAR) and cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR), and you will learn how to resuscitate adults, children and infants. Sound complicated? It's not. "It's not hard to learn, there's no exam," explains Ms. McDonald.

You may have taken a resuscitation course before, maybe in high school. If this is the case it's time to take another course. Ideally you need to take a class every year. What You Need to Know Before You Swim with Baby

Increasingly, new parents want to teach their babies to swim. The South Lake Leisure Centre offers courses for parents and babies that teach the little ones water familiarisation, breath control, submerging, independent swimming, climbing out of the pool and serve as important bonding time between parent and child. However before you and your baby show up at a course there are some important things you should know. The SLLC Swim School offers regular parent information sessions for mums and dads before they start the swimming course in the evenings.

The program is endorsed by the Royal Life Saving Society and Swim Australia, and is recognised and accredited nationally. The information evening will cover what you need to bring to the swim class, what to leave at home, and how the classes are structured. During the parent and baby swim course songs and games are used to teach swimming and water safety skills. Some of the activities covered in the swim classes include teaching your baby to back float, climb the stairs out of the pool, and walking in the wall to guide them back to the stairs. According to SLLC Swim School Coordinator Lari McDonald, aquatic activities need to be done with your child, not to your child.

"The parents who do (the Parent Information Evening) have much better experiences in the class," according to Ms. McDonald. The next information evening meets on Thursday, 23 November, call the SLLC Swim School, 9417 3003.

The Great Weed Escape: From Garden to Bush

Weeds are a threat to our natural heritage; they take over bushland, smothering native plants and inhibiting natural regeneration, The result is degradation and we are all the poorer for this loss of diversity.

Thirty percent of our weeds are garden escapes. Plants that look great in a garden can have a devastating impact on our bush. Some examples of these are:

Arum Lily (shown here). Seed is spread by birds and has become a problem in all our wetlands.

Gazania. A very tough plant that has in the past been used in street scaping but is now known to invade bushland particularly coastal dunes.

Pampas Grass. Each flower plume produces thousands of seeds that are spread by the wind. This plant has become a major problem around Lake Coogee and Market Garden Swamp.

If you have these plants growing in your garden, you might like to consider cutting the seed heads each year to prevent their spread or replacing them with another plant. Any queries, please contact Dave Bright in Environmental Services on 9411 3584.



Doing Your Part for a Greener Home, Not as Hard as It Sounds

So you have been reading the Cockburn Soundings for the last four months thinking that LA21 sounds big, and you're not sure how you can make a difference or get involved. Here are some ideas you can apply around the home that will help you to a more sustainable way of life. Some of these things you may already be doing.

Reducing your household output of Carbon dioxide (CO2) will help to reduce greenhouse gases. The average household emits 7075 kg's of Carbon Dioxide a year. If you reduce this figure your household would be doing its part in reducing global warming.

"How, how," I here you say.

One of the big emitters of CO2 is the family car. By keeping it tuned and having the correct tyre pressure you can get better mileage while reducing CO2 emissions. The faster you go means you burn more fuel and hence produce more carbon dioxide, another good reason not to speed.

"Easy," you say. Even better try taking public transport or now that the weather is warming use your legs.

Insulate your home and save on both heating and cooling energy requirements.

Remember to turn the lights off when not needed and think about installing energy saving light bulbs.

We all like to have hot showers but it takes energy to

heat the water (more CO2 emissions). Try and shorten your hot water showers.

Speaking of water, it's one of our most precious resources and yet we tend to forget its value when we have it at our fingertips. By installing water saving devices on your shower and taps you can save litres of water and don't forget to turn the tap off when cleaning your teeth or shaving.

No one likes to talk about toilets but did you know that you could save water here as well. If you don't have a dual flush system you can purchase a water saving device that only uses water when your finger is on the button instead of using the entire volume of the system every time you flush.

There are many more handy household hints to becoming sustainable like composting and worm farms. The best thing is that not only will you be contributing to sustainability you can also save money. Children Seen and Heard at Cockburn's Libraries



When you think of the library what comes to mind? Perhaps an image from childhood of a stern librarian telling the youngsters to keep quiet forms in your mind's eye. The place of young children in public libraries has changed over the years. From an expectation that children were to be seen but not heard, now many public libraries provide special programs for pre-school children.

Luba Kambourakis, the Youth Services Librarian for the City of Cockburn says that it is important that children are made welcome in libraries and introduced to books at an early age. "Reading to children develops their ability to acquire new sounds and enriches their vocabularies. In addition, it helps children build new concepts and exercises the imagination," she said.

Storytime programs provided by the City of Cockburn comprise of 30-45 minutes sessions where picture books are read aloud to children, followed by a simple craft activity. These are conducted at Spearwood Library on Tuesdays at 10.30 am, Fridays at 2.00 p.m. and Saturdays at 10.00 am. At Coolbellup Library they're held on Wednesdays at 10.30 am.

Sessions provide children with an exposure to a wide range of quality books that promote language development. To vary the program, children are sometimes introduced to finger rhymes, songs, story telling, felt board stories and puppets.

Mrs Nadilo of Spearwood attends the Storytime sessions at Spearwood Library with her children, Katie (5), Sarah (4) and Rene(?(2). "The family has participated since Katie was two and a half "she said. "They really enjoy listening to good stories and doing the activities. Afterwards, they love taking their activities home and displaying them in the cubby house. Throughout the week they always look forward to the day."

Mrs Nadilo said that not only had her children made lots of friends at the sessions but also she had an opportunity to meet other parents. "Best of all," Mrs Nadilo added, "the children feel part of the library now."

Throughout the afternoon the finale of the Battle of the Bands took place. Twenty-five local young musicians played original music for the crowd over the course of the day. The Battle of the Bands provides an important opportunity for local music talent to be a part of an outdoor concert. The bands were judged by record industry professionals from Seeing Ear Records. Skate Park Opens



The Skate Park was created for young people, and local young people have been very instrumental in its design and management. In 1998 a Council report identified a low cost youth facility as one of the City's needs. The need was also defined as a safety issue because young people need a place to go after school or work. The Skate Park is not something that adults have built on their own.

Local young people have been involved in the creation of the facility since the beginning. Council consulted with kids at school around the City during the design stage. A group of 20 young people continue to be involved as a management committee for the facility. This involvement is vital to the facility according to Recreation Services Coordinator Andrew Ward, "having the kids involved is hugely important. I would not have know what to do without the kids."



Lakelands SHS Reaching for the Stars



Cockburn once again leads the way with Food Safety. The Lakelands Senior High School Canteen has recently been accredited with a 4 star STARCAP rating from the WA School Canteen Association. What does this mean for the students? It means that the food being prepared and served to the young people is of a very high standard. Lakelands is the first school in the district to reach this high standard.

To meet the high standards of the STARCAP, the canteen staff at Lakelands has been fully educated in food safety. In other canteens inspectors check the food preparation procedures, at Lakelands the canteen staff carry out this important work everyday. It's as if the canteen is being inspected continuously.

The Star Canteen Accreditation Program (STARCAP) awards schools operating healthy canteens by using a star-rating basis of 3, 4 or 5 stars, similar to the rating standard used in other areas of hospitality and tourism. It recognises and rewards those schools operating healthy, profitable canteens and also provides incentive for others to work towards star status.

STARCAP is an initiative of the WA School Canteen Association (Inc), in partnership with the Heart Foundation of Australia (WA Division) and the Nutrition Program of the Health Department of WA, and is funded by Healthway.

Accredited school canteens are required to meet defined criteria in four key areas:

- Canteen policy
- School community involvement
- Canteen menu
- Hygiene and food safety

To satisfy the hygiene and food safety aspects of STARCAP, Lakelands Senior High School Canteen have successfully completed the FoodSafe Plus program. This makes them the first food premises in the City of Cockburn to follow the FoodSafe program to its highest level.

FoodSafe Plus is a food safety program for food premises based on hazard analysis critical control point principles (HACCP). HACCP requires a business to identify each stage of its food processing, identify what can go wrong at each stage, and put in place actions that prevent problems occurring.

Lakelands High School Canteen should be congratulated on their star performance and we can only hope that other food premises will aim as high as they have. Congratulations also go out to all the staff at Emmanuel Catholic College Canteen. They have successfully completed the FoodSafe food handler training and quality assurance program which is the forerunner of FoodSafe Plus.
