Cockburn's sustainable future



Cockburn has been recognised in the 2011 National Awards for Local Government for its climate change and sustainability program.

Mayor Logan Howlett said the City invests more than \$650,000 in renewable energy systems, research, new technology, policy and community engagement each year.

"Waste management initiatives include partnering to capture gas from landfill, a recycle shop and the introduction of weekly recycling," Mayor Howlett said.

"Other innovations include installation of 380 solar photovoltaic panels over." six community buildings with live energy data available online via our virtual power station."

"Community engagement is also a key focus with grants supporting sustainable living choices, free advice and courses on water and energy consumption, ecofashion workshops and more."

Overwhelming community response indicated local commitment to sustainable living.

"This award demonstrates the important leadership role local government can play in community climate change action," Mayor Howlett said.

Cockburn takes home Friendly Beach Award



The City of Cockburn's Coogee Beach has been awarded Western Australia's Friendly Beach Award for visitor facilities and forging links with its indigenous history.

Cockburn Mayor Logan Howlett said this award displayed the City's commitment to providing first-class facilities and access for people of all ages and abilities to enjoy this beautiful beach.

"These include easy access to the jetty and beach for people with disabilities and the elderly through the provision of asphalt paths and a concrete ramp. The City recently installed beach access matting for people in wheelchairs or prams, and provides access to beach wheelchairs to allow safe access," he said.

"The City has recently employed a full-time caretaker to assist with maintaining the amenity of Coogee Beach reserve. The caretaker is also able to assist visitors with information on facilities, promote safety of visitors and provide assistance to visitors should they require it."

The City also received a commendation in the Environmental Protection Awards.

Mayor Howlett said the City had established an excellent rapport with local community groups and other stakeholders, working together to enhance and protect the environment.

"The City works closely with the Friends of Coogee Beach, Coastcare, Coogee Beach Surf Life Saving Club (SLSC), Coogee Beach Progress Association and organisations such as Conservation Volunteers Australia on a range of projects, including planting, clean-ups and environmental education tours," he said.

The Clean Beaches Awards are run by Keep Australia Beautiful WA with support from the Department of Environment and Conservation.

This annual survey provides an insight into how the City of Cockburn's services are perceived. The City uses these results to evaluate and adjust its programs. The survey is conducted by an independent consultant using a random sample of residents across all suburbs.

What you say we do well

- Beeliar Drive construction of a second carriageway including streetlighting and landscaping \$350,000 (total cost \$2.2M)
- Hammond Road construction of a second carriageway including streetlighting and landscaping \$2M (total cost \$3.6M)



Wind-Mapping

Cockburn residents and businesses can now access local wind data online.

The City of Cockburn has mapped local wind data at 204 sites in partnership with Murdoch University.

Mayor Logan Howlett said the mapping shows average wind speeds across Cockburn, ranging from 4 to 5 metres per second, and offers detailed wind data per site, working from a 1km x 1km grid.

"The City's Greenhouse Gas Emission Reduction Strategy will see the City increase its investment in renewable energy on community buildings, making Cockburn the leading local government in WA for renewable energy," he said.

an integral role in the City winning the 2010 Local Government Biodiversity Award for its Landowner Biodiversity Conservation Program while Climate Change Environmental Officer Jenni Harrison was responsible for the City winning a National Local Government Award for leading community climate change action.

Rounding out the team is Sustainability Officer Vincent Cusack, who has a wealth of expertise and knowledge in his field, and several on-the-ground environmental crew members.






Council decisions

The Council recently adopted the Municipal Budget 2011-2012 and the City's Annual Business Plan 2010-2011.

The Budget outlines the schedules covering the capital works and operating initiatives and the schedule of fees and charges for the new financial year.

The City's Council chose to absorb costs wherever possible to keep rate increases low even though the City has incurred enormous increases in electricity costs passed on by the State Government of up to 28 per cent.



The Annual Business Plan details the business activities and projects to be undertaken by the City's various departments over the next 12 months.



Landowner biodiversity



The City of Cockburn is unique in that it has several rural zones within the metropolitan area — and grants of up to \$3000 are available to help preserve them.

Landowners with significant remnant bushland or wetland areas on their properties are encouraged to apply for Landowner Biodiversity Conservation Grants.

The program has previously helped to identify rare species of plants and conserve numerous hectares of natural bush and wetlands.

Funds will be granted to landowners to assist with weed control, revegetation, dieback management and various conservation projects.

The program also offers conservation training and skill development workshops to participants.

"CoSafe has forged a strong relationship with the local police stations and other services," he said.


"The cross-sharing of crime intelligence has been very successful."



Grants, donations and sponsorship funding opportunities

Applications now open

Applications are now open for the following funding opportunities to support local groups, organisations and individuals for a wide variety of activities and services:

Community Grants assist local community groups and organisations to provide projects or activities that benefit residents of Cockburn. Applications are to a maximum of \$15,000, with smaller amounts encouraged.

Sustainable Events Grants assist local community groups and organisations in the provision of ongoing programs and activities for the benefit of the residents of Cockburn. The maximum grant provided to any one group is \$7,000, over a four-year period.

Donations are available to provide financial assistance towards the day-to-day running costs of not-for-profit groups, not for a specific project or activity. Donations are limited and highly competitive.

Sponsorship is a mutually beneficial partnership arrangement where the City of Cockburn makes a

financial contribution to a group, organisation or individual for a specific purpose, project, activity or event and, in return, the City receives public recognition for its contribution. The maximum is \$20,000 for organisations and \$2,000 for individuals.

Cultural Grants support local arts and cultural activities. Applications can be to a maximum of \$4,000, with smaller amounts encouraged.


Youth Art Scholarships (under 18) are available for those who live in Cockburn and are either doing further study or travelling in relation to their art. These scholarships are to a maximum of \$500 to assist with fees, materials or travel costs.

Green jobs

Through the National Green Jobs program, the City of Cockburn is opening up new employment opportunities for local youth. The program will also help conserve our environment.

Participants will plant native vegetation to restore habitats and protect the dunes, install erosion-control measures, monitor flora and fauna and work on weed control.

The National Green Job Corps is a free Federal work experience and training program for 17 to 24 year olds receiving income support, with an environmental focus. As part of the program, trainees also undertake Certificate II in Conservation and Land Management.

The six-month program helps young job seekers develop skills in the green and climate change-related industries, fields that are becoming more and more important.



Participants will develop teamwork and leadership skills and their training will open doors to future employment.

Each year, the event presents many different pieces of collective art ranging from paintings to oil canvasses, structural art, wood and much more.






Cockburn Central Station – who are they?

Anyone who's travelled the southern end of the Kwinana Freeway lately will have seen the two giant faces on the tower at Cockburn Central Station. Mounted like billboards, they're individual portraits of a senior woman and a teenage boy, both with vivid facial features that blur out towards the edges.

The images are a public artwork by Marco Marcon and Rodney Glick, developed through a process of digital synthesis using photos of local residents. Titled 'The Face of the Community', the project represents the most frequent users of public transport, while juxtaposing elements of realism with the otherworldly and unknown.

The work now stands as one of Western Australia's most successful examples of public art. It has captured our attention, got us questioning its significance, and, most importantly, encouraged us to form an opinion.



Working from home can be so rewarding

Councillors Corner – Tony Romano



One of the biggest initiatives undertaken by the City so far this year is the introduction of weekly recycling of your yellow-top bins, which has proven to be a great success.

As a Councillor and chairman of the South Metropolitan Regional Council (SMRC), which is responsible for processing waste for the City and a number of other councils, I strongly advocated the need for a weekly recycling service to increase the amount of recyclables. The City's latest Community Perceptions Survey 2011 results show just how well it has been received with 97 per cent of residents satisfied with the service.

Through the introduction of the weekly recycling service far more residents are filling up their yellow-top bins with recyclables, which means less is going to landfill, making it better for the environment.

The City trialled a weekly yellow-top bin collection in Bibra Lake in 2007, which showed recyclables increased by 40 per cent during the trial period. Due to the overwhelming support, the City introduced weekly recycling in January 2011.

Recyclables are very valuable commodities which are turned into products we often consume daily.


