



Jandakot Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade gets Pumped

thanks to a donation from local rural real estate agent Peter Sampson of Remax.

According to brigade captain Ron Levett, the pump will be used to draft water from ponds, tanks, and swimming pools giving the volunteer brigade access to many sources of water in an emergency.

"The brigade welcomes this initiative of Remax to support the volunteer organisation, it's a benefit to the whole community," said Mr Levett.

The portable pump is fitted with hoses and nozzles and can be used as part of a fire-fighting unit or as a stationary appliance.

Do you know how to escape from your house quickly and safely in the event of a fire emergency?

According to the Fire and Emergency Services Authority (FESA) more homeowners and residents need to consider the importance of a home escape plan.

Terry Shehan, from the Success Fire Station, says preparing and practicing a home escape plan can help minimize the panic and unnecessary loss of time needed to reach safety in an emergency.

"It's no longer realistic to think that a fire will never happen to you," Mr Shehan said.

"In fact, during the 2000-01 financial year a total of 1,090 fires occurred in WA homes, causing property damage worth nearly \$14 million."

"The highest priority for local residents in a fire emergency is to get people out of the home and to a place of safety," he said.


"The best way to do this, is to prepare and practice a home escape plan."

Mr Shehan said in developing a home escape plan, residents should:

- Identify as many ways out of your home as possible taking the quickest path and decide on a meeting place outside.
- Make sure that doors and windows can be opened easily from the inside. Keep keys readily available.

 Practice your home escape plan regularly and make sure everyone knows the sound of a smoke alarm.

European Wasps - An Unwelcome Guest

The City's Health Service has received a number of enquiries recently regarding European Wasps. In addition to being an urban pest, the European Wasp is an agricultural pest, attacking bees and beehives, as well as causing damage to soft fruit and grape crops.

European Wasps have short, stout bodies similar in size and shape to a bee. Bright yellow and black, they have black antennae and yellow legs that are not visible during flight. They live in large, concealed nests commonly underground or in roof cavities, which are round in shape and with an outer covering.

Considerably more aggressive then other wasps, these wasps can sting repeatedly and will attract other wasps during their attack. Residents are advised not to approach the nest or attempt to



treat it themselves.

Often confused with European Wasps, Paper Wasps can be both yellow and black or orange and black, but are slender in shape and 1-2cm long, with a narrow waist. They generally make smaller, honeycomb nests that are commonly visible under eaves, fence capping or on sheds. While also able to sting repeatedly, these wasps are not as aggressive as

European Wasps and will normally only attack where the nest or swarm is disturbed. The most distinguishing feature of the common Paper Wasp is the manner with which they fly, commonly hovering with their legs hung clearly visible beneath them.

European Wasps may also be observed settling upon pet food and other fish or meat products.

While Paper Wasps might consume caterpillars, they are rarely observed settling on or demonstrating interest in meat products.

SUSTAINING COCKBURN

The City of Cockburn recently provided advice on the State Government's Draft Sustainability Strategy for Western Australia. This document is the first attempt in Australia to develop a comprehensive sustainability strategy at a State level. Together with the WA Collaboration, Cockburn hosted a community workshop in December to formulate a response to the strategy from the grass roots level. The public submission period has recently been extended until February 2003. The City of Cockburn is in the process of finalising its own draft Sustainability Strategy. The Strategy will assist in guiding Cockburn's operations and development within the City in a manner that can sustain Cockburn's unique natural environment, the lifestyle the community expects and employment opportunities into the future.

The Strategy builds on the work already undertaken as part of Cockburn's commitment to Local Agenda 21 and an extensive public consultation process throughout the development of the Strategy.

It is intended to have the draft Strategy available for a final round of public comment in March/April 2003, prior to endorsement by the Council. Once endorsed a range of Action Plans will be developed to set the City of Cockburn on the road to a sustainable future. CRIME in Cockburn

If one was to believe the stories and rumours one hears we would think that the city was really at the mercy of the criminals. Examination of the facts however paints a very different picture. The year just ended shapes up quite well compared with the year 2001. Total reported crime for the City of Cockburn (not ALL crime is reported) is indeed down by 2.3% overall with burglaries down

by some 8% for the year. While stealing is also down by 3% this is offset by a similar increase in wilful damage offences. It is pleasing to note any decrease in crime, however this reduction is not quite as good as previous years. Opportunistic stealing is one crime that features strongly in crime records with people leaving property in locations where it may readily be removed or failing to take adequate security precautions. "Insurance will cover it", is a prevalent attitude that makes little sense when the ever-increasing cost of insurance premiums is considered.

Council provides a number of services through its Safer City program to help residents take more care of their property. Cockburn's Safer City officer will have your property either engraved with your motor driver's licence number or photographed so that in the event of it being stolen the police may identify it as being stolen and catch the offender. As a resident of Cockburn this service of property identification is provided as a FREE community service. Phone for an appointment on **9314 3001**. You may even have your house number painted on the kerb at the same time also for FREE

TIDYING OUR CITY

Does the statement - "To make the City of Cockburn the most attractive place to live, work and visit in the Perth Metropolitan Area" sound at all familiar to you? This is the Mission Statement for the City of Cockburn.

If it does, you will be pleased to know that Council is embarking on a programme with the Mission Statement firmly in mind.

The programme is aimed at minimising the impact of unsightly or overgrown land in the District caused by seasonal vegetation growth or the presence of old, disused material (junk) laying around in people's yards in full view of passers by.

While such sights may not be offensive to some, it is becoming more common for

Council to receive complaints from the public about unsightly land in the City.

To address these concerns, Council has commenced a programme to notify owners of land identified as being excessively untidy, requesting them to eliminate the problem.

In most cases, this will simply involve the slashing of overgrown vegetation or the removal of some offending material from the land.

Hopefully, people receiving this advice will understand Council's

motives and cooperate with the request, as that will prevent more forceful action being taken to satisfy requirements.

However, if you do receive such a letter and would like to discuss the matter further, please contact the programme Coordinator, Mr Laurie Cetinic-Dorol, on 9411 3453.

Please note that this programme is not related to the Notice Requiring the Provision of a Firebreak, as required under the provisions of the Bush Fires Act.

The City of Cockburn is currently undertaking community research in an effort to identify the main concerns of its residents in relation to safety and security issues in the District.

To facilitate this, Council has engaged the services of a research consultant to work with the community in not only highlighting what the main issues of concern are, but also putting forward suggestions on how the situation in Cockburn could be positively addressed to! minimise the impact of crime and other antisocial activities.

Of particular interest to attached questi Council, is whether the and returning it

community would see specific benefit in certain pro-active initiatives being introduced as a service delivered by the City of Cockburn (e.g. security patrols, property identification schemes) and whether the community would be prepared to accept the cost of these initiatives, either through the introduction of a special levy or an increase in general rates.

To complement the exercise currently being conducted, Council invites all other residents to participate in this programme by completing the attached questionnaire and returning it

(REPLY PAID) to the City of Cockburn. The results of this feedback will be compared with outcomes from the more in depth research. Once this is completed, it is anticipated that some common trends will emerge upon which Council will be able to make some decisions on ways to address the major issues of concern.
