I acknowledge the other candidates and thank former Councillor Yaz Mubarakai for his contributions to Council and the community over the past four years. Councillor Reeve-Fowkes was re-elected as Deputy Mayor for a further two years at a Special Council meeting following the elections.

I thank the elected members, staff, volunteers and the community for their contributions towards making Cockburn a place of destination and vibrancy in Western Australia. My best wishes for a happy and safe festive season and a 2016 that realises your personal dreams and aspirations, and those of your family.

If you live in or near bush, fire of any size is a real risk to you and your family.

During a bushfire, firefighters may be unable to assist every property within a timely period. It is your responsibility to reduce your risks and take action to survive.

The City's fire danger signs located in Banjup, are updated regularly and warn the community of current alerts.

In the event of a bushfire encroaching near to, or upon your property, your best chance of survival is to leave when safe to do so. The City's Fire Control Order exists to reduce the threat of bushfires. Remember to listen to firefighters, police and rangers, they're trying to protect you.

Services at Success

The City's team of staff based at the Cockburn Integrated Health and Community Facility in Success offer services and programs ranging from healthy living to family support and run the popular local library.

Family Support is a free service for City residents and assists people to make informed decisions when dealing with a range of issues.

A Family Support Coordinator is based at the Facility and can provide help with arranging short term counselling, advocacy, group activities and referrals.

This can include organising counselling to help with grief, depression and stress or providing advice and referrals to assist with parenting, personal development or relationships.

GOLDEN SHOE AWARD



Success resident Dianne Black has won the National Heart Foundation Walking (HFW) Golden Shoe Award for being the best volunteer walk organiser in Australia.

Heart Foundation Walking is Australia's largest network of free community-based walking groups and is coordinated locally by the Health Promotion Officer at the City of Cockburn.

Dianne regularly does far more than expected of her to lead the City's longest running walking group. After leading a Neighbourhood Watch group for a number of years, she became a volunteer for HFW in 2008, leading the Yangebup Striders through numerous fun events as well as their three regular weekly walks. CUSTOMER SERVICE EXCELLENCE



Excellent customer service and a commitment to continuous improvement saw the City's Customer Service Team win a highly commended prize at the National Local Government Customer Service Awards in October.

The Cockburn team was up against Bellingen Shire Council, City of Canada Bay Council and Townsville City Council in the Customer Contact Excellence Award category with Townsville taking the top prize.

The awards received more than 30 submissions across five categories.

The highly commended award recognised the excellent performance of the City's team both front of house and on the phone in the contact centre.

It acknowledged a successful balance of people, technology, process and procedures.

The City's recent customer survey showed a 96.2% satisfaction rate for contact centre service and 100% for front counter service.

The City's Community Perceptions 2015 survey showed 85% of residents were satisfied with the level of customer service they received from the organisation as a whole.

Success Library continues to grow in popularity loaning an average of 1,000 items each day with about 16,000 members now signed up.

The library opened in its current location at the Cockburn Integrated Health and Community Facility on Wentworth Parade in September 2014 and now attracts about 700 visitors each day.

It has quickly become the busiest library in the City and visitors often speak of a 'wow' moment when they first walk through the doors.

All of the regular loan services and library programs are available but being located at the integrated facility brings an added bonus of easy access to partnerships with other tenants to provide a range of programs for the community.

A partnership with Curtin University offers an iPad class, two Memory Café sessions per week and an adult reading group for people affected by stroke.

The University is also involved in a fortnightly Aboriginal Health and Engagement Group in conjunction with the

GP Superclinic. Curtin students also run free health checks in the building's internal gallery on an ad hoc basis.

The Fremantle Multicultural Centre provides a weekly 'Inspire Me' program which assists migrants with job searching and computer skills. They also provide two conversational English groups. In addition, volunteers from 'Read Write Now' provide valuable one-on-one tutoring sessions.

Get your kids involved in the Children's Reference Group!



HOLIDAY WATCH

With the holiday season approaching, now is the time to start thinking about registering your home with 'Holiday Watch'.

Holiday Watch is a confidential service offered by CoSafe whereby CoSafe Officers provide random patrols of your property when you are away. Register and complete the online form here:

Checklist when going away:

- Set timers on lights.
- If your house is alarmed notify your monitoring company that you will be away.
- If you anticipate anyone visiting like plumbers, lawn and garden services, make sure you let them know and also include this information on your Holiday Watch form.
- Complete/submit the form 5 days prior to leaving.

The City of Cockburn has seen a significant reduction in paper use following the introduction of 'follow me printing'.

This process requires staff to swipe individual access cards at a printer to activate their print or photocopying jobs. This enables unwanted print items to be cancelled from the queue, or simply not printed, rather than being automatically produced as was previously the case.

Figures for August, the first month of the program, show a saving of more than 10% in paper compared to the previous month. This equates to over 10 reams of paper, or about 5,000 sheets.

The initiative was instigated by the City's Planning Team, supported by the Sustainability Committee and delivered by IT Services.

Australian Women's Army Service Camp – Bibra Lake

In 1941, with the WWII campaign in New Guinea stepping up, Australian servicemen who were engaged in home defence, were needed at the front. The Australian Women's Army Service (AWAS)

was formed that year to put women into non-combat military roles. Along with the traditional driving, typing and cooking, the women were trained in signals, plane spotting and other anti-aircraft manoeuvres.

Many anti-aircraft and searchlight batteries were set up throughout Perth, including camps at Jandakot, Naval Base and South Fremantle. Bibra Lake, however, was a regimental headquarters and housed a large group of military personnel both male and female. Built in 1943 or 1944 and just north of Hope Road, the camp consisted of pre-fab huts, ablution blocks and an underground command centre.

Local residents remember frequent searchlight drills lighting up the night skies and many local dairies and market

gardens supplied the camp. The AWAS ran the camp, with the women cooking and cleaning on top of their military duties. Though some were local, others were sent from as far off as Tasmania, going where the service needed them.

The searchlight batteries were dismantled and sold as soon as the war ended, but some recently-discovered remains at Bibra Lake show the extent of this piece of wartime history.

The site is currently on the City's heritage list and is also included in the Local Government inventory.

The Federal Government recently refused the City's request for Emergency Heritage Listing. The City is waiting on feedback from the Office of State Heritage regarding a request for State Heritage Listing.

GOING BATTY



Did you know that microbats play an important role in controlling midge and mosquitoes in the City of Cockburn? These pint-sized mammals can eat up to 1,000 insects each a night!



Microbats are an essential part of our ecosystem

Despite popular opinion, microbats are passive creatures, who like nothing more than to be left to sleep in the day and hunt for food at night. Microbats make very little noise (sometimes a mouse-like squeal can be heard at sunset as they prepare to leave their homes for the

night) and leave very little waste. In order to avoid the very unlikely possibility of disease, bats must not be touched or held unless by a professional handler.

Microbats (native to WA) and their habitat need to be protected and there are a number of ways you can help.

You can make homes for microbats by leaving old trees and hollows in your yard (providing they are not dangerous) and by constructing and installing a nesting box in your backyard. Each bat box can house up to 40 of these insect guzzling mammals! Over 80 bat boxes have been installed in eight of the City's reserves.

This year, you can make Christmas even more environmentally friendly by ensuring you correctly dispose of waste and recycling.



What goes in your yellow-top bin

- All plastics including cling wrap and plastic bags
- Plastic bottles, empty with lids off
- Steel and aluminium cans
- Aerosols
- All glass
- Polystyrene
- Cardboard, paper, newspapers, magazines
- All bottles need to be empty with lids off or they go to landfill
- Pizza boxes with food scraps scraped off
- Chip, lolly and pie wrappers, aluminium foil
- Light bulbs
- Nothing liquid or messy, please rinse and empty containers



What goes in your green-top bin

- Green waste, prunings and lawn clippings
- Used disposal nappies
- Food scraps

Popular Coogee Beach is all set for summer with the eco shark barrier reaching its first anniversary of continuous use in good shape and two pontoons now back in the water.


The shark barrier was re-installed at the beach in November 2014 and is to remain in place until the end of November 2017.

It was first installed at Coogee Beach from December 2013 to April 2014 as a trial and its success resulted in the Council voting to fund the barrier trial period for a further three years.

The City commissioned Murdoch University to monitor the barrier and provide an independent assessment of the environmental impacts and regular reports have also been provided by the manufacturer.

There have been no adverse impacts on marine life or sediment movement associated with the barrier during the past 12 months.

Results show that many marine animals have been observed seeking shelter along the barrier and this makes it a great location for snorkelling. There has also been no known incident where the barrier has caused an issue for marine craft.

While no shark attacks have been reported at Coogee Beach, the barrier has proved popular with swimmers as it provides peace of mind.

The pontoons are also a hit with swimmers - one has been placed inside the shark barrier and the other in front of the Coogee Beach Surf Life Saving Club. The City is planning to install a third pontoon just south of the jetty early next year.

In October the biennial elections were held, which resulted in the re-appointment of three existing elected members – Deputy Mayor Carol Reeve-Fowkes and Councillors Steve Portelli and Stephen Pratt – and the inaugural election of Chamonix Terblanche. Every two years, half of all elected members (known as Council) go to election for a four year term. Nine Councillors represent one of three wards in the City – East, Central and West.

Becoming a Councillor carries an important responsibility as Council's role is to listen to the people and to strive to provide them with a safe and vibrant community. Elected members need to care about their community, make decisions for the betterment of all and spend many hours looking after their residents.

In Cockburn, Council consists of nine Councillors and the Mayor, who is currently Logan Howlett. The Mayor is elected by the people for a four year term and is the head of the Council. Mayor Howlett runs Council meetings, is the official spokesperson for the City and works with public and private sectors to make sure the City and its community are well looked after.

Council meets once a month to discuss, debate and make a final decision on matters before them.

Decisions are reached by a majority vote of all members and are known as Council Resolutions.

As well as Elected Members, the City is comprised of Administration, consisting of a large number of staff employed by the Council to look after the City day to day.

The Chief Executive Officer is the head of Executive Services and is the chief adviser to the Mayor and Councillors. City Administration is divided into four directorates:

- Governance and Community Services
- Finance and Corporate Services
- Planning and Development Services
- Engineering and Works Services

These directorates operate the core functions of the City.



YOUR WARDS EXPLAINED

Each Councillor represents the interests of a particular ward (electorate) in the City, although their decisions must reflect the broader interests of the District overall.

The position of Mayor is chosen by the electors from the whole of Cockburn to represent the City of Cockburn and is currently occupied by Logan Howlett.

In Cockburn, three Councillors are elected by electors within their Ward to represent each of the three wards for a four year term.

West Ward – Deputy Mayor Carol Reeve-Fowkes, Kevin Allen, Lyndsey Wetton

Central Ward – Philip Eva, Bart Houwen, Stephen Pratt

East Ward – Steven Portelli, Chamonix Terblanche, Lee-Anne Smith OAM

The Mayor, together with your local Councillor, champions the causes in your area, including safety, traffic, events, development, waste and other community services.

As a resident, you have the right to contact the Mayor or your local Councillor with regard to issues and activities in your particular ward or in other parts of the District.

BUILDING PERMIT REMINDER



As the weather warms up, many Cockburn residents will be thinking about carrying out building works to upgrade their outdoor living areas but some keen renovators may not realise they need a permit to do so.

Under the *Building Act 2011*, the majority of building and demolition works will require a permit to be issued through the relevant local government authority.

Sometimes residents construct patios and sheds, or install spas, without getting a permit.

Since October last year, there have been 113 applications for a Building Approval Certificate (BAC) to be issued for retrospective approval of unauthorised works in the City of Cockburn.

Unauthorised building works are often revealed through the City's normal operations, during the property sales process or if a complaint is received from a neighbouring property owner or interested party.

Issuing a Building Permit prior to construction allows the City to ensure that basic requirements for health, safety and structural soundness are met as set out by the Building Code of Australia.

The Building Permit process also ensures that building work is in line with planning regulations, environmental or heritage requirements.

Unauthorised building could result in the City:

- Issuing a Building Order to stop work, demolish, alter, repair or remove the unauthorised structure/work
- Commencing legal proceedings in a Court to remedy unauthorised building work
- Compelling a land owner to obtain a Building Approval Certificate or an Occupancy Permit.

However, the City exercises discretion when deciding how to deal with unauthorised work, taking into account all relevant information including the available evidence, cost to the community of any action, the circumstances of the individual case plus public policy and precedent considerations.

SITE WASTE MAKES MESS



Construction waste is becoming a nuisance for the community at a number of building sites across the City.

In the past 12 months, the City's Rangers have received 135 complaints, issuing nearly \$9,000 in infringements.

North Coogee, Calleya, Beeliar and some larger new subdivisions are among the areas with the most complaints.

Residents who are experiencing problems with waste from adjoining or nearby construction sites are encouraged to report the problem to the City.

Local laws require construction sites to provide receptacles to contain the rubbish and failure to do so will result in a modified penalty of \$500. The City's Building Compliance Officers and Rangers are regularly involved in addressing those construction sites that are not provided with a compliant waste receptacle.

There have been instances of waste being dumped on vacant properties, with the waste becoming the problem of the vacant land owner.

Under the State's Litter Act, the City's Rangers are authorised to issue infringements to any corporation or individual involved, where litter is identified as coming from a construction site, even if a waste receptacle is provided but is clearly not being used.


YPA back in Full Force

A purpose built website will help users to easily access information via the touchscreen and the amazing fly-over video showcases the sustainable design aspects of the building.

The touch screen will also offer access to a list of service provider locations in the building plus information about Council projects and events.

Sustainability features include a 99 kW solar PV system, LED lighting, underground rainwater tanks, high levels of insulation and shading structures for improved thermal comfort.

The facility recently won two awards for builder JAXON at the Master Builders WA (MBA) Excellence in Construction Awards – for Best Public Use Building (Over \$20 million) and for Excellence in Energy Efficiency (Over \$20 million).
