### Colour crazy Cockburn Rotary Spring Fair



## What are we doing in these areas?

### 1. Traffic

The City is working on managing traffic congestion and supporting alternative means of transport, particularly around Cockburn Central and other activity centres.

A more robust transport network will include the development of cycleways, better promotion of alternative transport paths and lobbying for State and Federal funding for improved transport infrastructure.

In particular, the City will continue to lobby the State Government to fund the Armadale Road Bridge, which would link Armadale Road to North Lake Road and ease congestion surrounding Cockburn Central.

Other significant projects underway or in the design stage include:

<b>\$6M</b>	Expanding Berrigan Drive to include a second carriageway (Kwinana Freeway to Jandakot Road)
<b>\$5.7M</b>	Expanding North Lake Road to four lanes (Kentucky Court to Hammond Road)
<b>\$4M</b>	Upgrade of Rockingham Road (Phoenix Road to Spearwood Avenue)
<b>\$3.8M</b>	Construction of a carriageway on Pilatus Street (Berrigan Drive to the Airport)
<b>\$2.5M</b>	Expanding Beelihar Drive to four lanes (between Spearwood and Durnin Drives)
<b>\$2M</b>	Traffic light installation at Gibbs and Lyon Road intersection
<b>\$2M</b>	Construction of a carriageway on Verde Drive (Biscayne Way to Solomon Road).
<b>\$279K</b>	Extending turning pockets at North Lake Road and Berrigan Drive intersection

### 2. Streetscapes

The community has stated that they want more tree coverage in the City. This includes along our streets, in public open spaces and on private property.

There is also much support for preserving as much of our natural environment as possible and carefully managing our natural assets including the coastal area, banksia woodlands and the wetlands.

### 3. Local area development

Examples include:

- » Park upgrades in Atwell, Munster and Hamilton Hill
- » Landscaping and planting of trees on Coolbellup Avenue
- » Ongoing streetscape improvements in Hamilton Hill
- » Building Bibra Lake Regional Playground
- » Installation of the Coogee Maritime Trail.

### 4. Security

The City will continue to provide a safe and secure environment for its community.

This will include the security of all infrastructure, maintaining a security patrol service and ensuring coordination with State Government services responsible for law and order.

### COCKBURN ARC CHARGES AHEAD

If you have driven through Cockburn Central recently, you may have noticed that the development of Cockburn ARC (Aquatic and Recreation Centre) is taking shape.

The development site is a hub of activity with over 150 workers onsite every day. At the end of August, the centre was 70 per cent complete.

You may also have noticed a strange alien type object at the top of the tower. That is the first part of three water slides, each offering a different experience for the young and young at heart.

### STORY BY COCKBURN FAMILY DAY CARE, LIVING SERENELY

Over the past few weeks, Living Serenely Family Day Care has been suffering from bird fever.

“I run a family day care from my home and look after four pre-school aged children. We see the birds peering over the fence watching us eat our morning tea, and flying by as we stroll down the footpath during our regular walks around the neighbourhood.

I recently borrowed a Bird ID toolkit from Cockburn Library to fuel the children’s interest in local birds. The children were very excited about the items in the toolkit and couldn’t get enough of looking through the binoculars – for them that was the coolest item in the toolkit!

Using the binoculars, we were able to observe how the Purple Swamphens used their long claws to hold onto and eat reeds. Using the toolkit’s picture guide, we talked extensively about the names of the birds within the area,” said Serene, a registered family day care educator with the Cockburn Family Day Care Service.

- Mini-twitchers bird ID flipbook
- Shorebirds ID booklet and bird ID logbook
- Binoculars
- Set of 10 bird call CDs for hundreds of species
- Brochures including a Cockburn map

- Bird ID toolkit

## PROPOSAL FOR FREMANTLE TO TAKE HAMILTON HILL AND NORTH COOGEE

A 'Greater Fremantle Proposal' has been submitted by a small group of residents who are recommending that the City of Fremantle extend its boundary to include Hamilton Hill and North Coogee.

### Reasons NOT to proceed

There are strong economic reasons not to proceed for residents of Hamilton Hill and North Coogee:

- Cost to ratepayers to split the two suburbs
- Hamilton Hill is the historic hub of Cockburn, with the war memorial at Memorial Hall built by the pioneers of Cockburn
- Loss of weekly recycling collection service
- Loss of trailer passes
- Loss of security service CoSafe

## COMPLAINTS ABOUT ROAMING CATS

In recent months, the City has experienced a significant increase in complaints about roaming cats.

By confining your cat within the parameters of your property, you are protecting them from motor vehicles, fights with other cats, contracting the fatal feline AIDS virus and other infections, losing them and disturbing your neighbours.

### Are cats happy indoors?

Yes, however you must provide for their basic needs. Contrary to popular belief, cats do not need to be outside in order to exercise.

By the age of six months, all cats must be microchipped, sterilised, registered and wear a collar and registration tag. To assist, the City offers a \$50 subsidy to sterilise your cat.

## PET REGISTRATION SEASON

Responsible animal ownership starts with registering your pets. Having your dog or cat registered will assist in finding your pet if it becomes lost or injured.

Next month is the start of pet registration season. All dogs need to be registered with the City from the age of three months, and for cats, from six months of age.

Annual registrations cover the period from 1 November 2016 to 31 October 2017, regardless of the date that you register your pet. Registration periods are available for one year, three years or for the entire life of your pet.




### HORSE RACING IN COCKBURN

The Cockburn coastline has played host to many horse races since the earliest days of European settlement.

Early settlers held a pony race beside the beach at South Fremantle in 1833, complete with stands, food stalls, and entertainment - quite an accomplishment for a colony only four years old! Though the main racing industry developed closer to Perth, settlers in the Cockburn area entertained themselves with a number of local meets. In the 1880s a racecourse was marked out at Woodman Point, and in the 1890s Walter Powell developed his Coogee Hotel racecourse. These races became a fixture of the Fremantle-Cockburn society for decades.

In the early 1920s, famous ex-jockey Jack Marks built Randwick Stables on Rockingham Road in Hamilton

Hill, taking advantage of fertile soil to grow feed, and the nearby beach to exercise the animals. The following thirty years, a lively training and racing culture with stables owned and run by prominent racing names such as F.W. Johnson on Forrest Road, and A.W. Cooper nearby, as well as a host of smaller stables owned by Fremantle businessmen.

Randwick Stables is still standing on Rockingham Road and the legacy of horses exercising along South and CY O'Connor Beaches remains to this day.

### Berrigan Drive upgrade

The City will upgrade Berrigan Drive from Kwinana Freeway to Jandakot Road.

The \$7 million project involves:

- Extending Berrigan Drive for 700 metres
- Changing the roundabout into traffic lights
- Making improvements to Dean Road
- Construction of a carriageway on Pilatus Street for 1.7 kilometers

Council and its contractors will ensure that access is available at all times.

## Phoenix Revitalisation

The City has proposed to upgrade and beautify Rockingham Road between Phoenix Road and Coleville Crescent, and wants to know what you think.

The Phoenix Town Centre stands to be transformed into an attractive and welcoming environment for the community with road works being undertaken in the next 12 months.

The concept plan proposes to reduce Rockingham Road to one lane in either direction between Coleville Crescent and Phoenix Road. This will slow traffic, improve safety and create a green tree-lined street befitting of a town centre. Proposed work includes:

- Bike lanes
- Improved landscaping and paving treatments
- Improved public safety by rationalising vehicle access movements
- A roundabout system to safely manage business access
- New 50km/h speed limit



Safety check the front of your home.

Too often I see people not aware of the potential hazards caused by overgrown vegetation on their street verges.

The first 1.5 metres from the kerb should be free of obstructions with vegetation no higher than 600mm. Keep in mind that small children and animals may cross your verge and should do so with ease.

Shrubs and trees beautify your home, but please take care to ensure that you maintain passive surveillance onto the street while receiving maximum benefits from your landscaping.

Assess your own street verge, particularly the surrounds of your driveway to ensure your home is safe. We can all do our bit to make our City safe.


