# Councillor's Corner by Clr. Martin Reeve-Fowkes

Many people who know me, and my passionate support of the environment, have asked me why I voted in favour of the Port Coogee Marina?

It is great to have the opportunity to answer that question publicly.

Since December 2000, I have had the honour of representing Cockburn on the Cockburn Sound Management Council. I have been part of the local government and community representation on this body. We've heard about the decline of seagrass in the Sound, and we see the new industrial developments along the shoreline. Industry has encroached as far north as Woodman Point with the loss of our dog beach at Jervoise As Community Bay. Representative I have tried to ensure we maintain a balance between the natural Cockburn Sound we all love, and the needs of industry. The new Southern Harbour will, I am sure, eventually get built, and further industrial development will take place in the Sound.

Only the Residents and public opinion will moderate industrial requirements in Cockburn Sound. In the public forums that took place when the Multiple Use Strategy for Cockburn Sound was devised, it was overwhelmingly the 'boat users', who stepped forward to speak up for

Cockburn Sound. Whether they were fishermen or from the Powerboat Club the voice of these recreational users were heard loudest.

Having 360 additional boat pens at the Port Coogee Marina was therefore a huge deciding factor for me. I know that a great number of these people will love the Sound and fight hard for its preservation. The increased recreational use of the Sound by "boaties" will themselves, help to preserve it and provide an additional brake on Industrial Expansion.

The Marina's location, on that piece of old meat works seawall, and across those rocky inlets, towards the powerstation, gave me great concern with it's potential to cause sand erosion on Coogee Beach itself. It took several sessions with Mick Rogers, the Consultant on beach erosion, to convince me that we had Coogee Beach adequately protected.

## The final decider

When, after all the submissions, after all the discussion and after reading all the submissions - the developer agreed to:

- A) Increase the number of boat pens
- B) Provide 200 metres of public beach inside the development

C) Increase the car parking provisions by about 200 cars

I finally felt that the Community was getting a very good deal. I believe it will be a focus for Cockburn and will be loved by all as a recreational area with boardwalk cafes and safe swimming beaches for young children. All of your Councillors spent hundreds of hours at briefings, at rallies, and around the table with various consultants and experts on this issue. We all did our best to understand the environmental and social consequences and to gauge the people's support or rejection of this development and in the end we all had to use 'informed judgment' and I am confident that we have achieved the best possible outcome for all.

Talking with a Councillor from one of the northern suburbs and he said, "Ah! Yes! Cockburn, it must be very interesting being a Councillor in a place which is the buffer between us and the Kwinana Industrial Area". I've never thought of Cockburn as an industrial buffer zone, but perhaps that is not an uncommon view from the northern end of town. I hope our 'image' will change and people will say "Ah! Cockburn, that's where that wonderful marina development is!"

# Celebrating "Valunteering"

# Sunny Side Up Or Sunny Side Down



The bronzed Aussie is an icon of our country, and these days brown skin can be achieved naturally or with the help of an artificial source of sunshine.

Sun tanning beds or solaria are more accessible than ever before. If you are a user of sun-tanning beds, keep in mind the following useful information provided in the Australian Standard (AS2635:2002):

Persons
under 15
years old are
not to use suntanning beds.

Persons between 15 and 18 years old must have parental consent to use a sun tanning bed.

■ Patrons are not to use a sun-tanning bed more than three times a week with a minimum of 48hours between exposures.

Sun tanning units emit ultraviolet radiation; with some producing concentrations of UV radiation that can be up to five times the strength of a midday summer sun.

As a client using a sun-tanning bed for the first time, you should be asked to read some information on use of the equipment and sign a consent form to use the sun tanning bed.

Protective goggles are to be supplied for use by patrons when using a suntanning bed.

Any surface in a solarium that comes into contact with the patron's skin must be cleaned and disinfected between each use.

of the radiation emitted by solaria. It penetrates the deepest layers of the skin and may cause deterioration of the skin, premature aging, reduced level of collagen and blotchiness and pigmentation.

UVB radiation penetrates the uppermost layer of the skin and is the main cause of sun burn and skin cancer and may also cause rashes, itchiness and dryness to the skin as a result of solarium use.

The Australian Standard is not enforceable in Western Australia and is therefore a document that represents best practice for operators of solaria.

# Responsible Cat Ownership

The City of Cockburn has many areas of native bushland and wetlands that act as refuges for wildlife including birds, reptiles, possums and bandicoots. However, the remaining populations of native animals are coming under increasing pressure from predatory 'imports' such as domestic cats and dogs. Studies have shown that on average in a hectare of urban land there will be two domestic cats and each will kill 8 birds a year. (In most suburban areas only 20 birds hatch per hectare per year!) Cats have also been found responsible for 16 mammal and 8 reptile deaths each per year.

What can you do? Cockburn supports responsible cat ownership, particularly for residents near to wetland and bushland areas. Some simple things you can do as a responsible cat owner are to:

- Make sure your cat wears a collar with bells. Your cat will get used to wearing the collar and remember, cats can learn to hunt without ringing one bell, so two or three bells are better at alerting prey that may be on the menu!
- Desex your cat. This reduces the tendency of a cat to roam and also reduces unwanted litters and

feral cat populations. The City of Cockburn provides subsidies for cat sterilisation.

◆ Don't allow your cat to roam. Most people are aware that cats should be brought in during the evening to reduce hunting, but it will also assist in reducing cats being involved in road accidents, catching diseases from other cats and fighting with other cats. Did you know that cats can also be turned into content indoor pets? Cockburn's Environmental Services can provide information to assist in adjusting your cat to an indoor lifestyle.


