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MANAGERS WANTED AT BANJUP

The City of Cockburn is calling for expressions of interest from individuals or organisations in the district who would like to take on management responsibilities for the new Banjup Community Hall, located on the Denis DeYoung Reserve in Oxley Road, Banjup.

A committee, appointed by Council under the Local Government Act, will manage the hall on an on-going basis.

Once established, the management committee will operate the day-to-day functioning of the hall after entering into an agreement which releases the City of Cockburn from this responsibility.

The management committee has delegated power from Council which allows it to control the use of the hall autonomously in accordance with the management agreement.

BARRISTER BRIAN WINS IN WEST

Barrister Brian Wheatley (right) was successful in the West ward elections, one of only two wards which were contested in the City of Cockburn local council elections.

Three councillors were returned unopposed: Clr Ray Lees (Coastal), Clr Ev Wegner (East) and Clr Stephen Lee (South). In North ward Clr Tom Greengrass was reelected.

After his victory, Mr Wheatley said he wanted to ensure that the City of Cockburn and its councillors act in a fair and reasonable way towards all ratepayers and that residents have a better Cockburn in which to live, work and play.

For the first time, Council used space at Phoenix shopping centre in an effort to increase the percentage of voters at local government elections.

Although this move appears to have been successful, others factors such as noise,



security, availability of space and low turnout at traditional polling places will have to be considered before the experiment is repeated.

Following a special Council meeting, Clr Ray Lees was elected Mayor and Clr John Grljusich was elected Deputy Mayor. Details of committees and their members are available at Council offices.

STEP BY STEP TO A CIVIC PRECINCT

Council has taken a further step towards future development of the Phoenix Civic Precinct, the area bounded by Rockingham Road, Phoenix Road, Gerald Street and Spearwood Avenue.

A plan for proposed landscaping and other civic design improvements for the area has been produced by urban design consultants Hames Sharley, whose report is to be displayed at the Spearwood Library until June 24.

After further public consultation, the final draft plan was considered by Council, which adopted it in principle as an overall guide for future development of the study area.

The overall plan will require a significant funding commitment by Council over a 10year period and it has been agreed to proceed in stages, including:

- * Consideration of further public comments and consultation with the owners of the Phoenix shopping centre, Phoenix Hotel site, Lancaster House and with Spearwood Primary School.
- * Preparation of a draft implementation programme and budget for Council consideration.
- * Preparation of more detailed design plans for the first stages, including consultation with residents likely to be directly affected, prior to Council endorsement of these plans.

OUR COMMITMENT TO THE CONCEPT OF SOCIAL

The City of Cockburn acknowledges its leadership in the community by demonstrating its commitment to social justice. Our ideals are clearly set out in the mission statement on Page One. The policies which we pursue to support these aims are wide-ranging but specific.

Four main principles underpin the concept of social justice.

There are:

Access

The equal opportunity for all residents to participate in Council activities. This includes access to services, programmes, facilities, decision-making processes, and entitlements. Equity

Fair and equal distribution of resources (according to need) and opportunities.

Participation

Participation in decision-making about matters affecting people's lives.

Rights

Relates to the entitlement to justice for all individuals and includes freedom of assembly, speech, beliefs and information.

Council's social justice policy is focussed in five areas: planning and development;

participation; information and communication; community relations (how people interact and relate to each other as individuals and as a community) and training and

Planning and Development supports the inclusion of social justice principles into the planning and development process and activities, which will often reflect a needs based

services in a way which counters racist, ageist, sexist and other discriminatory role stereotyping. eg women as carers, the aged and disabled as passive and dependent.

JUSTICE

Participation endeavours to ensure that all residents have equal opportunity to participate in Council activities and decisions that affect their lives; at the same time it strives to minimise physical, attitudinal, social, economic and institutional barriers that prevent participation by individuals and

groups in community life. Information and Communication strives to provide information that is appropriate to the culture, language and ability of residents

and deals with their rights and mechanisms for addressing grievances and concerns. It also encourages multi-lingual and other staff to use and develop their communicating skills to assist Council in its activities.

STAY WARM, BUT KEEP THE AIR CLEAN, PLEASE

Open fireplaces, slow combustion heaters and potbelly stoves may give you and your family a nice warm feeling — but remember they are significant sources of air pollution. Prevention being better than cure, those who use these forms of heating can reduce air pollution by maintaining efficient solid fuel heating.

- Successful combustion requires sufficient:
- heat or temperature
- oxygen from the air
- turbulence or mixing of air and hot combustion gases to form the flame
- time to allow complete combustion

Incomplete combustion will result in excessive smoke, soot, odours and the production of toxic substances such as carbon monoxide, benzene and creosotes plus other carcinogenic (cancer-causing) compounds. Here are some other useful hints:

- 1. Always use dry wood and burn only wellseasoned hardwood timbers. Make sure the wood is not painted or treated with creosote or copper-chrome-arsenate (the green substance used in fencing).
- 2. If coal is used, ensure a proper grate and ashpan are installed, and use anthracite rather than soft coal. Coke and anthracite are better fuels because their lower content of organic material reduces the build-up of soot and creosote in the flue.

3. Follow the manufacturer's directions for the most efficient use of your stove or fire.

- 4. Do not overload the fire. Add smaller amounts more frequently for better heating and less pollution.
- 5. Do not smoulder the fire on a low setting overnight or any extended period because, although it may seem convenient, toxic fumes will be produced.
- 6. Never use your fireplace or solid fuel heater as an incinerator because excessive burning of paper can cause the chimney to catch fire and the burning of plastics or other substances can result in toxic fumes being released.

Another important factor to consider is this: When installing a fireplace or solid fuel

heater think also about the position and height of the chimney so smoke will not annoy your neighbour.

Minister Hears Our Views On Kwinana Development

THE Hon. Minister for Resources Development, Colin Barnett MLA, listened to Council's joint deputation to discuss concerns of the residents of Wattleup over the 'Towards Optimising Kwinana' report.

The Minister was advised of Council's position that the development of the Kwinana industrial area should not be expanded, and that development should not be impeded by the use of 'buffers' on privately-owned land.

Wattleup Citizens' Association representatives expressed concern over the stress caused by uncertainty for the future of their land holdings.

The Minister was asked to determine the matter with a degree of urgency.

A proposal was put forward that Council prepares a concept plan on how it sees the development at Wattleup proceeding. Council's planning staff are working to achieve this. The Minister advised that no decisions had been made and that they would certainly not be made in haste, nor without local community and local government input.



He acknowledged the impact of buffer areas on private property and said decisions had to be balanced with other Government responsibilities.

Afterwards, the deputation said it was pleased with the hearing it received from the Minister.

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
