Turning Streets into Communities

The City is launching 'Street by Street', a program to encourage people to get to know their neighbours. We are looking for enthusiastic residents to get involved.

Coogee residents Alastair and Jennifer have formed longlasting friendships with their neighbours and say that friends have made their street a home.

"I grew up in South Africa in a neighbourhood with a strong sense of community and family," Alastair said. "There were street parties, street barbecues, neighbours who would babysit and kids would always be playing on the street."

"We absolutely have that in our street here in Coogee. We garden together, go out for dinner, organise progressive dinners and impromptu Sunday afternoon drinks. And we have so much fun. We feel like we've made friends, not just trying to be polite so we have a nice neighbourhood." "For our first progressive dinner, we started at the house at the top of the street and we worked our way down, so we could take a tour of everyone's home. The former owners of the land, the Sokols, whom the street was named after, also came and brought their homemade wine and we had so much fun learning about their lives and the history of market gardening in the area."

Interested residents are invited to take part in the Street by Street program, to learn skills and be provided with lots of ideas and support to organise small gatherings in their neighbourhood.

Funds up for Grabs!

Below are various ways the community can access grants from the Cockburn Community Fund.

Community Grants – To help community and not-for-profit organisations deliver projects or activities that benefit Cockburn residents. Applications up to a maximum of \$15,000 are available.

Donations – For the day-to-day running costs of not-for-profit groups.

Sponsorships – For mutually beneficial partnerships with individuals and groups where the City of Cockburn contributes financially to a project and in return, the City receives public recognition for its contribution. A maximum of \$20,000 is available for organisations and \$2,000 for individuals.

Cultural Grants – To support individuals and organisations with residencies, local arts and cultural activities. Applications of up to \$4,000 are available.

Youth Art Scholarships – For under 18s undertaking further study or travel relating to the arts. A maximum grant of \$500 is available to assist with fees, materials or travel costs.

Sustainability Grants – For projects relating to sustainability that will assist households, small businesses, schools, community groups and not-for-profit organisations. A maximum grant of \$4,000 is available per group.

Small Events Sponsorships -

To encourage small-scale neighbourhood events. Maximum funding of \$2,000 is available per group or organisation. Open all year round.

Be a Good Sort!

In what is Western Australia's largest bin rollout education program to date, over the next three years the City's Waste Services Unit will help more than 29,000 Cockburn householders learn how to use three bins, including the new green-lid bin for garden waste.

The third bin was introduced as a cost-saving measure to separate out garden waste as an uncontaminated material for mulching and composting. If you put garden waste in your general waste bin, it costs eight times more to process. It costs much less to separate garden waste to make mulch than processing it as general waste.

The program involves door knocking to chat with residents about the new system and to provide a recycling kit, waste calendar, written information and a series of bin audits to support residents' transition to the new system.

Waste Education Officer Candy Wong says checking the bins provides residents with helpful feedback on how they're using their bins, in order to reduce contamination and improve recycling rates.

"You get some people who think they have been sorting their bins out correctly and they learn how they can do more. They make a small change that cumulatively makes a big difference, one that if every resident starts to do, results in a massive reduction in waste."

Unpolluted garden waste can be transformed into high quality

mulch that the City sells to fund other projects, services and infrastructure in the local community. The mulch will be used to reduce garden water use in our drying climate.

"People think recycling is the big end game, it's not. It's about reducing what we are consuming because that has a flow on effect: the less you consume, the less you throw out which means less ends up in landfill."

Did you Know:

- Waste Education Officers all have a background in sustainability and have a valid police clearance
- 80% of the Three Bin System's new users sort their waste correctly, increasing to 90% with ongoing education
- Residential properties with land 400m² and over will receive a third bin
- 18 suburbs will receive a third bin over the next three years
- Residents will incur no extra charges for the three bin system
- The City has received a grant from the Waste Authority of WA to help with the

educational program and the purchase of the new 140L red lid bin costs for 2017-18

- No fines will be issued for contaminated bins
- People who repeatedly pollute their bins with the wrong rubbish may lose their garden waste bin
- Bins that are contaminated may not be collected
- Recycling messages can be confusing as each council processes their waste differently – we have an education process in place to make sure our residents know how the system works in Cockburn and reduce confusion

- Colours of bin lids are being updated to ensure consistency with the Australian Standard
- Audits involve a brief look through the bin to identify material types – no items are removed and no personal details are obtained. Small tags are added to each bin to provide individual feedback
- Results from rollout zones completed so far have shown that the bin auditing program is very effective in improving waste outcomes

Top five, we get wrong

Nappies – these should ALWAYS go into the general waste bin.

Chip packets – you may think they're foil, but they're silvercoloured plastic. Don't worry about washing it – just shake the bag and pop it in the yellow recycling bin.

Cling wrap – if it's clean, put it in the recycling. If it's covered in meat juices, it goes in the red lid general waste bin.

Meat trays – you get plastic and Styrofoam. Throw the bloodabsorbing packet into the general waste bin, rinse the plastic or Styrofoam and throw it in the yellow recycling bin.

Soiled tissues and dirty paper towels - general waste bin!







Celebrating our Community

In 1954, when Ray Dorey was just two-years-old, he and his family moved to Hamilton Hill. Ray's mother and her parents had land where Hamilton Senior High School now stands and Ray's grandfather, Charlie Anning served as a Councillor and Anning Park was named after him.

Ray says since he and his wife, Cockburn sports hall-of-famer, Christine, built their family home in Coogee in 1992, he's seen a lot of changes in Cockburn and it has been a great area to raise their two sons.

"As a kid, we used to swim in the lagoon behind the power station and jump off the bridge. It was a great spot to do bombies. I remember walking down to Coogee Beach from Hamilton Hill for swimming. It's always, to me, been a wonderful beach."

"Back then, you had the abattoirs, the industrial area, Robb's Jetty and the power station, so the area wasn't as sought after," Ray said.

Ray says he looks forward to catching up with old friends at the annual Pioneers Luncheon, which he has been attending for the past 25 years and considers it a privilege to attend.
