We want to hear from YOU!

Soon after the Commissioners were appointed to the City, we undertook an extensive market research program to find out what residents thought about electoral issues. These included whether there was a preference for elections by postal vote or in person; whether the Mayor should be elected by the people or by the councilors; the number of elected representatives and the number of ward boundaries Cockburn should have.

The result in favour of postal voting and the election of the Mayor was very clear and we immediately initiated these changes.

Council now seeks your views on ward boundaries and elected member representation. A comprehensive series of options have been developed and from these Council has selected a preference.

We encourage your participation in this important matter and ask you to review the information Council is distributing so that you can give us your views. (A large portion of this issue is devoted to this information.)

Response to the Report of the Inquiry

Council has now received the Report from the Inquirer and Council has responded to the Minister supporting the recommendations made by Mr Douglas.

It is the Commissioners' view that the Cockburn community deserves strong, robust and responsive representation from its elected members. It is our sincere hope that the people who stand for election in the future will acquaint themselves with the findings of the Inquiry and use this information as a benchmark for achieving good government for Cockburn.

No community should be deprived of its elected local government if that body is truly committed to the service for which it is elected. Being involved as an elected member begins and ends with a desire to serve the community: no more and no less.

It is our one hope that in the future, Cockburn is represented only by people who earnestly want to serve the community for the benefit of the community.

HAVE YOUR SAY! REVIEW OF WARD BOUNDARIES & COUNCILOR NUMBERS

Council is considering a change to its current Ward structure and Councilor numbers as a result of an extensive survey conducted throughout the district in September, 1999.

The results of that survey have already assisted Council in making changes to the way that the Cockburn community will be represented by its elected members. These include:-

- Introducing Postal Voting for Council elections.
- Election of the Mayor by the community at large.
- Retaining a Ward System based on:-
 - Equal number of Councilors representing each Ward
 - Ward boundaries to be aligned with suburb boundaries, to eliminate some suburbs being separated into different Wards.

While the community has clearly indicated it wishes to retain a Ward system of representation, the survey results did not provide a preferred number of Wards wanted by residents.

Because of this, Council staff have prepared a comprehensive options paper which illustrates a variety of possible Ward structures ranging from 2 Wards to 14 Wards and just about everything in between.

Of course, with such a large variance in these alternatives, there are points for and against each option. **THIS IS WHERE YOU CAN HELP**. Council staff have considered all options and made comment on the suitability of each. However, if there are reasons why these opinions are not shared by the community, then it is important for Council to be aware of them.

Council is providing extensive information on this subject to encourage community participation and feedback.

Your input to this process will provide Council with valuable assistance and information upon which it can make a decision in the best interests of the community as a whole.

As a means of kick starting comment on this matter, Council has endorsed one of the options prepared in the Report, as its most preferred. This option recommends three (3) Wards, each being represented by three (3) Councilors in the short term and eventually increasing to four (4) in the long term. Together with the Mayor elected by the people, this will constitute a ten (10) person Council in the short term, eventually increasing to thirteen (13).

This option is illustrated here to depict how the Wards will look in the short term, and as a comparison when the City is fully developed. Also shown is a map of the current Ward structure with its Councilor numbers.

This indicates that only one suburb change will be necessary to accommodate this Ward Option. This will require the splitting of Bibra Lake into two suburbs, using North Lake Road as the defining boundary.

It is being suggested that the area between North Lake and Stock Roads be renamed West Bibra Lake in order to create a clear distinction between the two communities. In addition, that boundary also serves as a Ward boundary in both the short and long term.

Apart from that, no changes to suburb boundaries are needed to accommodate this option in either the short or long term scenarios.

It should be noted that while Council has endorsed this option as its most preferred, it has not adopted it for the purpose of change at this stage. Much will depend on the level of public involvement and comment in determining Council's final position on this subject.







GARBAGE, DOMESTIC WASTE, RUBBISH, HOUSEHOLD REFUSE

whatever you call it, it is the Number 1 most important local government issue (and it's the background to this story!)

It's no surprise though that you consider it important, it's one of the major issues facing the human race. The more products we develop and the further we advance technologically, the more "throw-away" our society becomes and most of us now realise that the amount of refuse we are producing is not acceptable. We certainly don't want to be known as the generation that scarred and tainted our planet. Yet we are rapidly running out of land-fill sites across the world.

This is why YOU, in the last Community Needs Survey, identified recycling as one of the highest priorities. Your Engineer's department at the City of Cockburn has taken it one step further.

By the end of 2001 less than 20% of our household refuse will be going to landfill!

In anyone's terms that's a huge reduction but it will come at a price. Considering, however, the priority at which you rated this issue I think you will be surprised at how little the cost is!

One of the reasons we have been able to keep the cost to a minimum is by combining resources with other councils.

Together the Cities of Fremantle, East Fremantle, Melville, Canning and Cockburn are building a Regional Resource Recovery Centre at Canning Vale. I think you will be stunned and amazed at the capabilities of this centre which will be enclosed and certainly a lot more visually attractive than the current "landfill facility" or "garbage tip" as most of us call it.

Residents of the City of Cockburn have embraced our current recycling program with enthusiasm but wait till you see where we are

By the middle of 2001 our current garbage bin and recycling bags will be replaced with two recycling bins. One bin will be for the currently acceptable recyclables such as glass, newspaper, carboards, steel cans, aluminium cans and various forms of plastic (currently P.E.T.) and another bin will be for all other household waste and weekly green

waste. We will still have the tri-yearly green waste collections.

The traditionally recyclable contents of the first bin will go into the process seen below. They will automatically be sorted into the various bins. Current recycling companies will be pleased to buy the already sorted product.

The contents of the second bin will be put into the giant composting machine (also pictured) where it will be mulched with green waste and composted over a period of time to produce recyclable mulch. The mulch will then be mixed with bio-organic waste to produce an organic mulch/fertiliser. It is expected that this product will be much in demand to replace current phosphorus based fertilisers which are polluting our waterways and ground-water.

Construction of the plant and providing the additional bins obviously will be an expensive process and therefore your rates will increase by \$20 in the first year, and \$50 in 2002. This

works out to be 38 cents a week and 96 cents a week respectively. Considering where you rated this priority that is indeed a small price

But there is BETTER news ahead! The City of Cockburn still operates a landfill site at Henderson. At current dumping rates this site will remain open until about 2010. As time progresses and land-fill sites become more scarce "dumping fees" will increase and this site will become an income earner for the city. It will be your opportunity to tell the Council where you think the money should be allocated. Local government is your government.

Council is really proud to be involved in investing in our future and that of future generations with forward thinking waste minimisation strategies and we have to thank you for rating recycling as such a high priority. Every resident of the City of Cockburn, will be able to hold their head high, knowing

"we have done our bit"!

Woodman Point Environmental Enhancement Project

Community Reference Group Holds It's First Meeting

A recently formed Community Reference Group for the Woodman Point Environmental Enhancement Project held its inaugural meeting on 17 April at the Woodman Point Wastewater Treatment Plant in Munster.

After an initial tour of the site and an in-situ explanation of the project, the Community Reference Group returned to the Wastewater Treatment Plant, where a more detailed overview of the project was given by Woodman Alliance personnel.

"Starting the meeting with a tour around the site was an excellent way of introducing us to the project and was very valuable for our understanding of the proposed work," Mr Bart Houwen residential representative and Group member said.

"It allowed us to visualise the various components of the work and the actual location and size of the future facilities."

The Community Reference Group was formed to enable the Woodman Alliance to consider the concerns of the Group and the people it represents, to assist with the dissemination of accurate inform ation about the project and to enable the community to provide feedback to the Alliance on the environmental enhancement works being undertaken.

Members representing residents include; L Mihaljevic, T Ingrilli and B Houwen, representatives of local industry include; T Dobbs of Cockburn Cement, Mike Baker of the Kwinana Industries Council and Jim Warnes of Weston Bioproducts. Other members are, Cmr Julian Donaldson and Kirsty Stratford of the City of Cockburn, Phil Jennings of Conservation Council WA, Denise Crosby of Wetlands Conservation Society and Paul Byrnes of the DEP.

COOGEE PRIMARY SUCCESS!

On the 25th May 2000 the Coogee Primary School held a special ceremony to symbolically acknowledge the commitment and contributions of the City of Cockburn, Coastcare, GreeningWA, Cockburn Cement and APACE to assist with the management of McNeil Field.

McNeil is a remnant area of bushland on the Coogee Primary School. The area faced an uncertain future until Mr Keith Brown, teacher and bushland co-ordinator, approached the City of Cockburn with the idea of sharing the land with the council. With the Coogee Primary School and City of Cockburn co-managing the area as a conservation reserve and use as a educational tool for the students.

"We saw this as an important first step towards the management of the area, as the Education Department could not actively manage the bushland area" said Keith Brown.

Keith Brown maintains an environmental education program at the school, and co-ordinates the management committee which maintains the schools bushland area

Two and half years later the idea has become reality. With the hand over of the bushland area by school principal Mr Warren Bell to the City of Cockburn's Environmental Officer - Mr Paddy Strano. The event was symbolised by a jar of soil taken from McNeil field.

Along the way the Coogee Primary School have made a number of achievements. On the day the school received \$13250 from Coastcare to assist with the management of the bushland area. Kathy Ronalds handed the cheque on behalf of Coastcare to Warren Bell – School Principal. Alison McClelland on the behalf of Greening WA provided a number of native plants.

"Coogee Primary School is fortunate to be surrounded by bushland. The bushland is valuable not only for it's conservation values, but also for it's educational value. The relationship with the school will benefit the school, the City of Cockburn and the community", said Paddy Strano, City of Cockburn Environmental Technical Officer.

Debbie's full time carer, Tony, believes since Debbie moved from an institution to the Pinakarri Community she is a lot happier and more independent. "Here Debbie has people who care about her and who are willing to spend time to make her life as easy as possible and who want her to be happy".

- ✓ Not cough or sneeze near food.
- Not to touch or scratch themselves while preparing food
- ✓ Not to smoke or eat in the kitchen
- ✓ Keep their fingernails short and clean
- ✓ And to wear clean clothes

They are taught the importance of

- keeping food either hot (above 60°C) or cold (below 5°C)
- using utensils wherever possible to minimise handling of food
- thawing food in the fridge or the microwave, not on the bench
- ✓ separating raw and cooked food; and
- checking deliveries coming in the shop

FoodSafe shops have effective cleaning rosters and the premises are cleaned and sanitised on a regular basis.

FoodSafe premises also keep all those nasty disease spreading pests away so you can be sure that mice, rats, cockroaches and flies are not welcome in a FoodSafe shop!

Congratulations are extended to the staff of Villa Dalmacia, the presentation of the FoodSafe award was most enjoyable, particularly the tempting treats prepared for the morning tea by the happy ladies! Students from Hamilton High School's Hospitality and Tourism class were rewarded for their FoodSafe training with certificates of participation awarded by Principal Environmental Health Officer, John Hardy. The FoodSafe list has grown even further with the newly accredited premises of Baker's Delight and the Winterfold Child Care Centre joining those premises already dedicated to food safety.
