

Landowner Grants assist in conserving special wildflower

The City's Bushland Management Consultant Dave Bright recently stumbled across an unusual find while out surveying a property in Banjup for eligibility of the City's 2008 Landowner Biodiversity Conservation Grants.

Mr Bright instantly recognised the pink-flowering shrub as an unusual Verticordia, more commonly known as Drummond's Featherflower.

It is only the second time this particular wildflower has been found in Cockburn.

Mayor Stephen Lee also took a trip out to the property to view this special wildflower.

The City's Landowner Biodiversity Conservation Grants provides assistance to landowners who wish to conserve and enhance the natural bushland on their property.


While some dared to take a ride on the camel, others were content with sampling a variety of multicultural foods, treating themselves to a Henna tattoo or enjoyed the live band.

"It is outrageous that the City, which has close to 80,000 residents, should have to travel to Fremantle or Garden City for the nearest Medicare office and queue up for long periods of time," said Mayor Lee.

"Cockburn Gateway Shopping City has a draw of up to 200,000 people within a 10 kilometre radius and is the perfect location for this much-needed facility."

No more graffiti!

The City has been working hard to remove graffiti from our district and we want to remind our residents of the City's Graffiti Policy and how they can help make our city more beautiful by reporting it.

Many residents don't realise that Council will remove graffiti free-of-charge from your property if the graffiti is visible to the public, once it has been reported.

If the graffiti on your property is offensive in nature it will be removed within two working days of it being reported to Council, and any graffiti of a non-offensive nature will be removed within five working days.

The City's Safer City's team also reports all graffiti damage to the police so they are aware of any targeted areas.

Let's work together as a community and report any sightings of graffiti to Council so Cockburn can remain the beautiful place it is.


Introducing the Safer City Services team...

City of Cockburn Vision

Community Needs

Council recently conducted its tri annual Community Needs Survey with a random sample of residents across all suburbs. This survey identifies community opinions and attitudes on services and facilities provided by Council. Identifying eight key areas of community motivation and needs within the City of Cockburn.

One in two residents choose to live in Cockburn because of affordability, ease of access and close proximity to family. Other strong motivators included close proximity to the coast, Fremantle and type of residence. 91% are satisfied with their quality of life in Cockburn, of which 61% are delighted. 88% of residents believe their quality of life is steady or improving in their local area.

It is the City's mission to make Cockburn the most attractive place to live, work and visit in the Perth metropolitan area, and it is clear that the survey outcomes have provided some areas of priority for Council to focus on. One in two residents agree that the City of Cockburn has a good understanding of the community's needs and communicating a clear vision for the area.

Our plan for the future utilises the results from the community needs survey to address the strategic planning areas including:

- Demographics providing services and facilities,
- · Infrastructure,
- Lifestyle and aspirations,
- · Governance,
- · Employment and economy,
- · Natural environment and
- · Transport.

Consultation

Council has recently introduced a customer contact centre to improve how residents access relevant and timely information. Council has released it's Corporate Governance Charter, demonstrating Council's commitment to principles addressing the core issues of accountability and community consultation in the management and decision making processes of



Council. The Governance Charter refers to a wide range of policies and position statements reflecting Council's guidelines in relation to the culture and vision it wishes to achieve as an organisation.

Other Areas of Focus

From the results of the survey, the City has identified a number of areas that need to be addressed to improve performance, community perceptions and needs.

The priority issue identified was safety and antisocial behaviour. While it is acknowledged that community safety is largely a function and role of the State Government, the City of Cockburn is committed to assisting the relevant authorities, particularly the police service, in providing greater peace of mind to the community.

Council is constantly striving to improve safety and security, particularly through the Community Safety and Security Service (CSS). This service provides a visible security presence across the cities of Cockburn and Melville with security staff on duty 24 hours a day and contactable on 1300 653 643.

Youth Facilities & Services

Council is aware that the provision of services and facilities for its young people is very important. A new \$6 million youth facility has been built to focus on activities for young people and opens July/August 2008. This magnificent facility, located in the growing suburb of Success (near Cockburn Gateways Shopping City) will provide a variety of youth orientated facilities and programs for the young. Accessibility / Road Safety & Improvements

\$1.6 million has recently been spent improving the road and safety of Hammond Road South through Success and Hammond Park.

The Cockburn Rd realignment along Port Coogee was opened in March 2008 and bulk earthworks are underway of the road extension for Spearwood Ave (between Hamilton Rd and Cockburn Rd) including the Cockburn Rd intersection.

The City of Cockburn has allocated funds for the realignment of Russell Road and link through to Rowley Road. This forms part of the regional and major road works program. Land acquisition and road design has begun, with construction of a two-lane road scheduled for 2009.

As part of the City's future road safety and accessibility vision the development and construction of roadways connecting Spearwood Ave, Barrington and Beeliar Dve are commencing with land acquisition in 2008-09.

Further details on all road infrastructure projects are listed in the City's 'A Plan for District 2008 – 2018.'

Seniors Facilities & Services

Cockburn Seniors Centre:

Conversion of the City's Civic Centre Spearwood to meet the needs of active seniors. The City has many active seniors' groups, but limited dedicated facilities for them. This facility will provide specialised services. It will operate as an interim facility, with activities then located to the Cockburn Bowling Club precinct to allow redevelopment of the site as part of the Phoenix Activity Centre development, around 2010/11.

Seniors and Community Bus Transport and accessibility is a growing concern for Cockburn's older population and therefore a multipurpose 24 seater community bus will be provided as part of the 2007-2008 budget.

Sustainability & Natural Environment

We have many sustainability projects and 'green' initiatives underway in the City including:

- Water conservation strategy;
- Sustainable public lighting project;
- Photovoltaic cell feasibility study, which is currently being carried out on two of Cockburn's buildings to assess the viability of installing a PV system.
- 'Living Smart' courses (FREE). Seven week course teaching skills to save money at home, while being environmentally conscious.
- Focus on recycling and reducing our greenhouse gas emissions, continually working with the SMRC to increase the level of recycling in our City from both residents and businesses.

Feedback and Vision

The 2007 Community Perceptions Survey additionally reported high resident satisfaction in the service areas including:

South Lake Leisure Centre (79%) Council Website (77%) Parks and Gardens (83%) Festivals and Events (80%)

While the results are encouraging, there are still opportunities for improvement. Residents can be assured that it is Council's intention to take on board the comments from the community and translate that feedback into its planning process for the future. Stay tuned for next month's vision update.

Our schools remember








The Cockburn Junior Travel Assistance program helps local athletes by providing assistance for travel to state or national competitions.

Recycling is the word!

Did you know that around 4,000 tonnes of commercial waste is delivered to our Henderson Waste Recovery Park each week? And out of this commercial waste, there are materials that can be recycled into other products?

When recycled products such as steel, timber and plastic are removed from the waste stream it not only benefits the environment but also saves precious airspace in the landfill. The City is currently one of the only few councils in Perth that recycle products from their landfill site.

How are these recycled products collected?

To ensure the effective removal of these products, a 13 tonne grab excavator sifts through the waste on the active landfill face, which is then sorted into designated bins. A truck then comes and picks up the recyclables from the site and delivers the material to the end-user.

Where do these recyclable materials end up?

The steel and the plastic is shredded by the purchaser and shipped overseas to be reused as raw material. To date, an average of 10 tonnes of steel alone is transported from our Henderson site each day. Before any wood material is removed from the site, it is shredded and then put through a machine to make wood chips. These wood chips are currently used by companies for dust suppression, soil stabilisation and landscaping product. During the 07-08 Summer 6,000 cubic metres of wood was recycled into wood chips.

Where to from here?

The City is constantly working on innovative methods to improve environmental outcomes in waste recovery, and is currently in the process of building a transfer station for the recycling of domestic waste. Stay tuned for further updates on this!

Working Together Towards a Better Tomorrow


In the past two years the City of Cockburn has donated 44 unused sets of desktop computers and ten multi function printers to computer recycling program, CliCK.

Formerly known as the Regional Students' Association Computer Recycling Program, CLiCK (Communities Linking Computer Knowledge) is a sustainable initiative that makes true of the saying 'one man's trash is another's treasure'.

Rather than being thrown away these computers are refurbished and recycled back into the community, many finding homes in our community with people that need them.


National Volunteer Week

Facts:

- The 2008 theme for National Volunteers Week is Volunteers Change Our World.
- More than 5.4 million adults (34% of the population) do voluntary work each year.
- Volunteering continues to grow in 1995 24% of the population volunteered, in 2000 32% and 2006 35%.
- Volunteers contribute more than 700 million hours annually.
- Strongest representative age group is 35-44 year olds.
- 50% of volunteers do so because they believe they are helping others.
- Volunteer rate is higher outside of capital cities (32% to 38%).
- 36% of women volunteer whilst 32% of men volunteer.
