2018 Inspirational Volunteer a shining example of ethical and active citizenship

A woman whose tireless work to improve the local community for all – people, plants and animals alike – is the City of Cockburn's 2018 Inspirational Volunteer of the Year.

Christine Duckham, who has been volunteering for several community groups in Cockburn since her retirement 20 years ago, also took out the award's Environmental & Animal Protection category. She was one of 63 nominees.

Christine is a volunteer with Hamilton Hill Community Group and Hub, Friends of Dixon Park, Friends of Clontarf Hill and Cockburn Community Wildlife Corridor. City of Cockburn Mayor Logan Howlett said the environmentalist had brought many people together and inspired others to follow in her footsteps.

"Christine is a shining example of ethical and active citizenship," Mayor Howlett said.

"At Hamilton Hill Community Hub, Christine helped instigate the move to new premises, ensuring the building obtained its change of use approval, and has successfully applied for grants to help facilitate workshops there.

"Numerous planting days and clean-ups on Clontarf Hill and its recent reclassification as an A-Class Reserve is due in part to her efforts." Winners of the other categories are:

GAPP to lobby for improved sport and recreation facilities in Hami Hill

Improving the regional sports facilities and recreation spaces at Dixon Reserve, Hamilton Hill is the City of Cockburn's focus as a member of a local government lobby group, Growth Areas Perth and Peel (GAPP).

GAPP, made up of 11 outer metropolitan councils, is campaigning for a \$350m Federal Government allocation to a special purpose account that will provide outer metropolitan communities with high quality sporting facilities like those in Perth's inner city suburbs. GAPP proposes to also leverage a complementary investment of up to \$700m from State Government, outer metropolitan local governments, and development contribution schemes.

One of the aims of the GAPP campaign is about giving everyone in the community a sporting chance to lead active, healthy lives.

Cockburn is seeking a \$15m contribution from this potential future fund to develop Dixon Reserve into an integrated sport



and recreation hub, with a skate park, bike pump track, outdoor reserves for a variety of sports and replacement of the Wally Hagan Recreation Centre with a sixcourt indoor multipurpose sports stadium.

The first phase of the campaign will run for the duration of the Federal election campaign.

Working together for a safer community

The police and the City of Cockburn have one common reoccurring problem; people are not reporting crimes to the right authorities or in some cases, not at all.

Isolated mobile apps and social media are not monitored by the police, do not feed into the national crime database and do not have enough privacy protection for people reporting the crime.

The City of Cockburn is building a unique relationship with the Western Australia Police Force (WAPOL) and Crime Stoppers, which is focussed on information sharing leading to targeted crime prevention strategies.

Who do I report what to?

We urge you to report any incidents or suspicious activities to the following organisations. Just remember that Crime Stoppers is an intelligence database that sends information out to relevant departments to action. When calling the police or Crime Stoppers, call CoSafe as well as they are often closer to the incident than the police.

000 (Emergency)

- Emergencies that are **life** threatening
- For a crime that is being committed or has just been committed (includes fire and medical emergencies).

131 444 (Police)

- Non-emergency situations that require police attendance, e.g. car theft, anti-social behaviour ASB, hooning, property related incidents, burglary
- For crimes that have occurred.

1300 333 000 (Crime Stoppers)

- Non-emergency situations where immediate attendance is not required, e.g. criminal activity or suspicious behaviour
- You can remain anonymous (as you are not reporting to the police directly)
- Information can be current or from the past.

1300 26 72 33 (CoSafe)

- Non-emergency situations e.g. ASB, vandalism, graffiti, suspicious behaviour (this will be reported to Crime Stoppers), noise complaints
- Call the police first, and then call CoSafe
- CoSafe respond to calls within 15 minutes, so may be closer to the incident than the police

Please help us to keep Cockburn safe. No matter how trivial you think your information is, it might be the missing link for police.

Proud to be smoke-free

Ensuring that our sporting clubs have clean and healthy facilities is a key goal of our Champion Clubs program. The City of Cockburn has installed new smoke free signage across all its sporting precincts, in partnership with South Metropolitan Health Service (SMHS).

The project started in April 2018 with an audit of current signage and a count of cigarette butts at six facilities: Aubin Grove Sports and Community Centre, South Coogee Reserve, Nicholson Reserve, Meller Park, Len Packham Reserve, and Davilak Oval.

Following a positive response to this trial, in January 2019 signage was rolled out across all 20 of the City's sporting club facilities, used by 46 local sporting clubs.

The new signage has a simple message: we are proud to be smoke free.

Travis Moore, City of Cockburn's Manager of Recreation and Community Safety, said the project aimed to make sporting environments safer for the community.

"The project forms part of the City's aim to create healthier sporting club environments for the community, especially as the smoke-free venues are popular with young people and families," he said.

The project was recognised at the 2018 Local Government Children's Environment and Health Policy Awards, receiving a commendation in the Smoke Free Environments category.
