Cockburn resident John Longley, an ABC listener, believes this statue is the best piece of public art in Perth.

Longley says the bronze statue is unique because it is in the ocean. The sculpture was owned by Tony Jones in 1999 and commissioned by the City of Cockburn.

"Charles Yelverton O'Connor, pioneer civil engineer, is a great hero of WA because he was a major contributor in both Fremantle and Western Australia," Mr Longley said.



mayor's message

I hope you all enjoyed a lovely Easter and got to spend some quality time with family and friends, maybe even enjoy one of our family movie nights at Manning Park.

There have been a number of good developments as well as some disappointing ones in recent months.

You may have seen in the media last month the temporary closure of our household compost facility at the Resource Recovery Centre in Canning Vale, which prevents the emission of 180 000 tonnes of greenhouse gases each year.



The closure occurred after a number of significant odour complaints from the Southern Metropolitan Regional Council's Resource Recovery Centre. It is important that these odours are addressed and any necessary maintenance or upgrades preformed as soon as possible. We fully support the recycling facility and the benefits it has for improving waste management and all our futures. We expect the necessary improvements will not take too long and the facility will be operational within the next few months.

On a more positive note, our developments designed with sustainability principles are moving ahead. We've seen the recent approval of the Cockburn Central Detailed Area Plan. This development has been designed as a transitorientated focus around the new Cockburn Rail and Bus Transfer Station.

aboriginal kids & parents group in coolbellup

A new playgroup has started in Coolbellup - Kulunga Waabin. This playgroup is for Aboriginal families in Cockburn, specifically for Aboriginal children aged 0 – 3 years.

Kulunga Waabin is part of the Kids Across Cultures Project and the Indigenous Parent Support Project, coordinated by Cockburn's CHEYAG – Coolbellup/Hamilton Hill Early Years Action Group. The project has received a lot of support with funding from the Department of Community Development.

Health professionals in the Cockburn area, such as community health nurses, local schools and parents, identified the need for this group. The programme will be semi-structured learning and will help children get used to some of the routines and activities that may take place in kindy or pre-primary school.

A parent, grandparent or family member should attend with each child. A bus is available for pick up and drop offs to some areas.

The project is supported by the City of Cockburn, Pineview Community Kindy and the Coolbellup/Hamilton Hill Early Years Action Group (CHEYAG).

YAC get a taste of the bigger issues

Six Youth Advisory Committee (YAC) members got a taste of federal politics in the national's capital last month.

The YAC delegates toured Parliament House and met Senator Rachel Siewert of the Greens Party and Simone Want – Policy Advisor to the Hon. Malcolm Turnbull. Members discussed their concerns about climate change and the export of uranium to countries which are not signatories to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty.

All six attended two public hearings at Parliament House conducted by the Commonwealth Department of Health and Aging Committee and the Joint Standing Committee of Treaties.

The delegates were fortunate enough to visit sights of significance including the Australian Was Memorial, the High Court, Duntroon Military College, Old Parliament House and the Australian Institute of Sport.

The Cockburn Youth Centre tender to commence works was passed at the April 12 Council meeting. The facility will be a two-storey 2350m2 building near Gateways shopping centre and Cockburn Central, off Beeliar Drive.

The multitude of features of this state of the art facility includes:

Multipurpose performance space/ indoor recreation; accessible stage | a hang out informal lounge area | a multiuse activity space/ creche | training/ computer room | multi media space | jam/ music room | kitchen | outdoor area | amphitheatre for outdoor events and performances | barbecue area | landscaped garden

The Cockburn Youth Centre will colocate existing Cockburn Youth Services, Youthreach South (a new Department of Health service specific to the needs of young people with mental health issues) the Strong Families Project Coordinator for the region and other relevant youth organisations.

Stephen Cain, CEO, said: The Youth Centre will provide access to skills development (educational, social and

personal) through organised programmes and activities. It will also provide access to a safe and supported neutral environment where young people can "drop in", meet informally and have the opportunity to pursue and showcase their skills and talents through a wide range of recreational activities and programmes.

"This includes break out rooms and areas for youth to practice musical instruments, arts and recreation. This exciting development is due to start within one month and is another example of the City's commitment to improving community facilities for youth," Mr Cain said.



'The free screenings are a great family outing and as it's not always easy finding things to do for the kids on school holidays, hopefully families enjoyed the films'



'I look forward to seeing you all in the near future at other Manning Park movie nights,' said Stephen Lee.








health tips from cockburn...

information for petting zoo enthusiasts

Petting Zoos are now a common site at local shopping centers, fairs and fetes and enjoyed by children and adults of all ages. Most petting zoo's offer the public a chance to feed a bottle of milk to a piglet or lamb, or maybe hold a hamster or guinea pig while they nibble happily on the end of a carrot.

With their popularity in mind, the Department of Health has put together a set of 'Petting Zoo Guidelines' that aim to provide health advice to zoo operators and visitors in WA.

The guidelines provide practical advice to avoid contracting 'zoonoses' - diseases that can be transmitted from animals to humans by direct and indirect contact. Animals may look well while carrying harmful infections that can be pass on.





As a visitor to a petting zoo, it's recommended that you remember to:

- Not touch your mouth or lick your fingers
- Don't kiss or press animals to your face
- Don't eat while handling animals
- Do wash your hands thoroughly with soap and warm running water after handling animals, their food containers and enclosures
- Do wash children's toy or dummies if they have come in contact with the animals or the floor.

Operators should provide hand-washing facilities (or an alcohol-based cleansing lotion) for patrons and offer reminders to parents to ensure children wash their hands properly.


